David: One down, 5 to go

JULY 1989 marks one year for David Bruce behind bars. It was on the 25 July 1988 that sentence of six years in jail was imposed on him for refusing to serve in the SADF.

Although this first year has represented a very difficult period of adjustment for David, he is now beginning to settle down into prison routine and make the best of a deplorable situation.

This artificially-imposed social isolation is very painful for Dave

and he is always eager for local news. Yet, one year on, he remains without regret and strong in the conviction that his course of action was the right one.

On 1 August Dave received upgrading to Category 4 prisoner status.

This is the highest category.
David now has more privileges, including contact visits and his own cell.

Recent visitors report that he is in very good spirits.

ON Sunday 30 July about 130 people packed into one of the rooms at Temple Emanuel Synagogue in Johannesburg to mark the first anniversary of the start of Dave's six-year prison sentence.

The programme was fairly informal. Highlights included Andrew Buckland's declamation of his praise-poem (published elsewhere in The Objector) and guitar music by Steve Newman, as well as a candle lighting ceremony in which many people participated.

It was heart-warming to see how well Dave is remembered, but heart-breaking too — with the principal character missing — still behind bars in Pretoria Central.
