

Minutes of the meeting between Emfuleni Local Municipality and the Zone 10 Community Representatives held on Thursday, 15 January 2015 in the VAAL Boardroom. OK Building Vanderbijlpark.

1. Opening and Welcome.

Mr. Mohajane welcomed everyone present and duly declared the meeting opened.

2. Apologies

Mr. Lempe

Mr. Dick Bishop requested to leave at 10:45 to attend another meeting in Sedibeng

Mr. Tinus Redelinghuis was represented by Ms. Tšisetso Ramaelle

Mr. Mohajane to be excused at 11:30 to attend a funeral.

3. Adoption of minutes

The minutes were accepted a true reflection of the previous meeting with the correction of "it" to "on" on the approval of the previous minutes.

Moved by Tebogo Morobi seconded by Mantsie Mabote.

4. Matters Arising

5. The meeting agreed that reports will cover all areas to be raised on the item.

The meeting also agreed that the community raise the issues for which they have requested the presence of the departments.

6. Reports

6.1. Sports and Recreation.

The community raised that matter of zone 10 having no sporting facilities, they also indicated that there has been many promises of facilities being built but this has never happened.

Grass cutting was also indicated a sore point whereby it was being used and bad elements in the community to terrorize the community.

Mr. Bishop also indicate that there was matter of the two municipal houses being illegally occupied by the said community members and that this also needed to be addressed as these houses belonged to the municipality and not the occupiers as it stood.

The meeting resolves that these matters be considered by the department and that communications and discussions take place between the department and community through Mr.Tsubella.

6.2. Waste Management

The community raised the matter of illegal dumping, irregular waste collection and residents who are currently recycling in the residential properties.

The implementation of By-Laws to ensure that there is not violation of the terms and conditions associated with waste management and collection.

- In 2008 Paul Mashatile promised to fix houses and until now, nothing has happened.
- Its use has become a white elephant.
- There are people occupying houses illegally.

Ward 16

- A request was made to the Council to assist with transport funds to school by the member of the community because her parents cannot afford to help her because they are poor.
- Lack of consistency to waste collection.

Ward 21

- There was a request for food parcels to assist the HIV/Aids infected community members.

Ward 22

- There is a high rate of youth unemployment
- Concerned about a cooperative that has been registered since 2011 but has never been provided with a business.

Responses by the MMC's

MMC Ranake

- On the issue of waste collection, she said that the challenge was due to vehicle lease contract that has expired. The vehicles are very limited hence there is no consistency in waste collection. She pleaded with the community to curb illegal dumping.
- The community need to advice the municipality about what they wish to utilise the open spaces for, whether the open space is converted into a park etc.

MMC Malindi

- There are other initiatives that are in place like creation of opportunities through EPWP and CWP programmes.
- The Council also continues to attract investors to Emfuleni Municipality.
- In Ward 11 and 22, a raffle (fuduwa), was applied as a method of hiring people to projects, therefore it is not true that the municipality uses nepotism to hire people.
- Skills workshops for the youths will be organised by the LED department.
- People with registered businesses or CK's were urged to go to Supply Chain Management so that their businesses can be captured in the municipal data base.

Presentation

The Executive Mayor Greta Hlongwane thanked everyone for attending the meeting. She clarified the community members regarding what was published about her in the Sun daily newspaper. She denied the allegation that she insulted people and explained what she exactly spoke in her own words.

The Executive Mayor presented the progress report on the implementation 2011/12 projects and feedback on issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation meetings.

Ward 11

- The road from Steelpark to Sharpville need speed Humps, it is not safe for children who cross it every day on their way to school

Ward 12

- Need more information on how to register indigents.
- People from Lesotho are considered first when applied for RDP houses
- The Council is appreciated for the good work done
- Need for police stations.
- There is an ECD being built, the question is whether it will cater people with disabilities.
- Some ELM facilities are not accessible for people with disabilities.
- Proposed that ELM should come up with a new strategy for collection of rates and taxes.

Ward 13

- EPWP said they are feeling demoralised because they don't know when is their temporary job ending.
- Proposed that ELM support students funded by Anglo American in VUT, providing internships or jobs
- Proposed that SMME's be workshopped, especially contractors.
- In the township there are incidents of family members fighting for the ownership of the house, especially when the parent dies.
- Concern was raised that MM is earning lots of millions as read in one of the national newspapers but there is no evidence of service delivery.
- Kensington houses need to be repaired
- The Metsi- a- Lekoa call centre is not functional because no one pick up the community members calls.
- Sewerage not working in Sharpeville.
- Proposed that there should be community dialogue on payments of Municipality services.
- It has been observed that there are indigents who are paying due to lack of information.
- Issuing of Municipality billing Statements to the community is a costly exercise; it will be good if the money for printing could be saved for the use of other important things.

Ward 14

- High rate of unemployment
- Foreigners continue to be provided with RDP houses despite the backlog of SA citizens who are on the waiting list
- Need for high mast lights
- RDP houses are being illegally sold
- No one is attending to the damaged house of an Elderly woman in Masebethane
- Since applied for an RDP house in 2007, when asked on progress, the response was that application forms were damaged by water
- The work of the current council is appreciated
- Need for Police Stations

Ward 22

- There is grass growing in Tshepiso Tennis Volleyball courts
- Sporting codes have been reduced
- There is a high rate of youth unemployment

Responses by the MMC's

MMC – Cllr Malindi

- ELM Council is concerned that most of the people are not working as a result the indigent's increases.
- The municipality is working hard to create job opportunities, so that people may come out of indigents programme and start paying their services
- To address unemployment Duncanville Corridor initiative was approved, it consists of companies that will employ a reasonable amount of people who are not working, Enterprise hubs will also be established in Sharpville and Sebokeng
- There are other initiatives that are in place like creation of opportunities through EPWP and CWP programmes.
- The Council also continues to attract investors to Emfuleni Municipality.
- ELM has partnered with business in providing skills on business to the SMME's.
- Resolution was taken by the council that 13 properties be sold (particularly Council vandalised building, including old abandoned shops). The process will be in the form of tender where people bid.

MMC – Cllr Godoli

- In addressing the issue of illegal dumping at sea point, she requested the community members to identify a common place to be a dumping site. This will help the community even during the times when the trucks are broken and unable to collect to use it.
- Cllr Godoli appealed to community members who are renovating their houses to take rubble to legal dumping sites.
- She encouraged the ELM community to keep the environment clean.
- Issue raised about EPWP's that they are instructed to work in illegal dump sites will be investigated.

MMC – Clr Pitso

- Clr Pitso said Mochobane and Dlamini streets are part of the streets submitted in a business plans to request funding from MIG.
- ELM has no sufficient funds to address all the issues raised; it means improvements in payments of municipal services will make the difference.
- There is a program in place to unblock all stormwater channels in ELM.
- It should be noted that the new recreation and sports infrastructures are now being built in a user friendly way for the people with disabilities.
- The issue of erecting Speed humps in Andries Pretorius ,Steelpark will be investigated to see its feasibility .In the meantime parents are encouraged to ensure that their children cross the street safely on their way to schools and secondly it should be noted that there are school patrollers in place.

MMC Ranake

- Appealed to the care workers of children not to misuse children's grants.
- There is money for the extension of Tshepiso Clinic.
- Care workers, especially owners of crèche should be aware that they will be constantly visited to check if they comply with the law in the running of their centres. She appealed to them that they should attend meetings when invited; they should not be threatened by rumours that their crèches will be closed.

MMC – Clr Radebe

- Clr Radebe made the community members aware that ELM constantly interacts with Sports Council regarding sports development of their areas
- Regarding a truck in Tshepiso that is blocking the traffic, he requested the councillor to address the problem urgently.
- Clr Radebe outlined on the progress of erection of the courts next to the stadium. He explained the fencing done is part of phase one.
- He notified the community members that no alcohol will be allowed at the swimming pools, especially bottles. The facility is being used by children and swimming learning programmes takes place there.

MMC – Clr Mcera

- Clr Mcera said Crime strategy has been adopted by the Council that is a document that will be used to address crime.
- CPF has been launched.
- Mobile policing is in place including 10 cars in 5 sectors. Two officers has been provided per sector.

MMC – Clr Thulo

- The need for highmast lights is noted.
- Tshepiso South lights will be connected by Eskom in the financial year 21012/13.
- Eskom will be invited to the public meetings to come and answer some of the issues which are in areas of their competency.
- Clr Thulo appealed to the community to save water because it's a scares resource.

MMC – Clr Ronyuza

- Clr Ronyuza said, since July 2012 ELM has been sending statements on municipal services to the community which indicates the money they owe to the council. He said he believes the list also included the indigents; but they should approach the ELM offices to renew their status.

MMC – Clr Ntombela

- Clr Ntombela responded on the issue of the concerned EPWP's ,she said no one is hired without contracts.
- She clarified the issue of MM salary, that the media published wrong information that was later corrected in the same newspaper. She further explained to the community members that MM salaries is legislated, and there are several factors that are considered like job market related salary scales, qualification etc.

MMC – Clr Khubheka

- Clr Manana said , allocation of housing is in Tshepiso in extension 4, Tshekeng people will be considered next time
- She warned the illegal occupants of RDP houses that they are going to be evicted.
- People should note that it is illegal to sell RDP houses.
- In explaining what happened at Masebethane she said the council had applied for 91 subsidies but 8 qualified. The council disputed the results and re applied of which 22 qualified. The balance will soon be attended to, there is still other extension phases to be built soon.
- In regards to foreigners occupying RDP houses, she said this happen because some of community members do them favours.
- Clr Khubeka said it should be noted that there are other means the government use to address issues of housing ,for example, social housing in a form of rental stock.
- In regards to issues of eviction of orphans from their homes, she said its a legal matters, she advised that individuals contact legal aid board.
- Repairing of houses in Kingston will be done in phases.

Closing remarks by the Executive Mayor

- There is a new policy for indigents .It states that if a community member owns a house that cost R150 thousands upward, he or she should pay rates and taxes. Valuation will be done soon and if people are in that category and not working they should register as indigents
- Regarding family fights for the houses, it is not the competency of the municipality to intervene. People are encouraged to draw wills regarding their assets.
- The proposal to pay flat rate of R200 is not acceptable because that money will not be sufficient to address issues of service delivery.
- The Executive Mayor thanked everyone for coming and their cooperation during the meeting.

Opening and Welcome

The Programme Director Cllr Tshabala requested one member of the community to open the meeting in prayer. Cllr Bikitsha welcomed everyone present, followed by Cllr Thulo introducing councillors subsequently Cllr Ranake and all officials present.

Purpose of the meeting

Councillor Malindi said the purpose of the meeting was to give feedback on issues raised by community members during April/May 2012 public participation.

Presentation

In her opening remarks the Executive Mayor commented on allegations made in the Sun newspaper, that she insulted community members. In clarifying the matter she stated that she was appealing to the community members to pay municipality

services and explaining that fixed rate won't be acceptable. She said it was unfortunate that she was misquoted.

The Executive Mayor presented the progress report on the implementation of 2011/12 projects and feedback on issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation.

Ward 3

- Small streets in the townships need to be fixed too.
- Proposed that a fix rate of R200 for municipal services be paid.
- Request that people in Boipatong living in the backroom of houses be billed separately on municipal services, this will avoid disputes between Landlords and tenants.

Ward 7

- There are no timeframes reflecting on the presentation on when the projects will be completed.
- Grateful that Bophelong stadium is complete.
- The language used in the presentation is not user friendly.
- Need for speed humps.

Ward 8

- Need to know the criteria that will be used to hire people to work in a Regional Sewer Scheme Project.
- Need for old age centre.
- Ambulances turnaround time is slow and there are no doctors at the clinics, eventually one is referred to hospital.
- There are dangerous neglected opened channels

Ward 23

- The Bophelong stadium is not complete

Responses by MMC's

MMC - Cnr Khubheka

- People have to understand that when the Council refers to the project as started, they also include feasibility studies.
- The issue of including timeframe is noted.
- Title deeds are found in Bophelong offices.

MMC - Cnr Ranake

- The issue of man referred by clinic to Johan Heyns will be followed up
- ECD in Sharpeville is in progress, it will also include old age facility, it is then after its completion that Bophelong one will start
- Cnr Ranake encouraged the elderly people to form Lunch on Clubs and they should be aware that those initiatives are usually supported by Provincial Social development department.

MMC - Cnr Radebe

- Cnr Radebe said the Stadium is complete, there is gym and some nets erected

- Any dissatisfaction will be addressed and should be noted that ELM regularly engage with Bophelong Sports Council

MMC - Clr Godoli

- Clr Godoli said, due to financial constraint and trucks that sometimes breaks that dates are sometimes missed for waste collection. This does not mean the community members should create illegal dumping. She recommended that community members identify a common place where everybody can use for dumping

MMC - Clr Thulo

- Sewer Scheme Project is going to address all sewer problems encountered in Emfuleni. So far the project is in the design stage.

MMC - Clr Malindi

- ELM is working hard to reduce high unemployment rate. Currently the Duncanville Corridor has been approved which will create many jobs. In 2014 the logistic hub will be established in Old Iscor Plots. The initiative will also reduce indigents in the community.
- SMME's companies will be alternated when provided jobs by ELM, to ensure that everyone benefit. The Regional Sewer Scheme project will benefit all residence of Emfuleni.

Final Remarks by the Executive Mayor

- The Executive Mayor in her closing remark said, the projects that were not done properly will be fixed. She thanked the community for showing appreciation to the council work.
- Regarding the orphans she said, the building of the other orphanage is in the pipeline
- The issue of paying R200 flat rate on rates and taxes is not feasibly. The money won't be sufficient to develop Emfuleni
- She made an announcement on a new job initiative called CWP whereby 50 people are going to be employed in ward 6; the project is being rolled out per ward. The criteria that will be used to employ, first preference will be given to the very poor households.
- She advised that, the same people should not be employed in all projects, everyone should get a chance. Stormwater programme and sidewalks are on the pipeline, that will cater people using wheelchairs on the streets
- She finally thanked everyone for coming

Opening and Welcome

The programme director Cllr Ranake asked one of the community members to open the meeting in prayer, then Cllr Zondi welcomed everyone present.

Cllr Ranake introduced the DMM's and all other officials present, thereafter the Executive Mayor Cllr Greta Hlongwane introduced the Mayoral Committee members and Councillors.

Purpose of the meeting

Cllr Ranake said the purpose of the meeting was to report on the 2011/12 projects and achievements. She highlighted that the Municipality is required by legislation to constantly engage with the community on matters of development within its jurisdiction area.

Presentation

The Executive Mayor Cllr Greta Hlongwane thanked everyone for attending the meeting. Her opening remark was largely about her briefing to the Parliament about the municipality's state of affairs. She also made emphasis on payment of rates and taxes as well encouraging the community to keep the environment clean. The Executive Mayor presented the progress report on the implementation 2011/12 projects and feedback on issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation.

The following are comments raised by members of the public after the Mayor's presentation

Ward 19

- Poor road conditions, potholes and concern regarding littering in all public open spaces

Ward 24

- How true is it that the municipality is in financial crisis?
- It is strange that employees want overtime.
- There is still a need for orphanages.
- Concern over which EPWP workers that are not doing their job yet earning.

Ward 38

- Difficult to access ward councillor
- Ward Committee need emergency numbers to report illegal shack dwellers.
- Newly built houses should be installed with electricity to curb protests
- Emfuleni should have its own security rather than using the Red Ants.
- Red Ants should be used for legitimate purpose but not abuse the community.
- Why cant Emfuleni use the Red Ants to vacate illegal dwellers, rather than the community paying the Sheriff to do that.
- There are people with C forms but have not yet allocated houses.

Ward 43

- Need for the municipality to assist an emerging young businessman with transport as he has already created.
- Needs for title deeds at Machaeneng.

- Concern over irregularities on the employment selection process at the fire station.
- Illegitimate tender processes that have a negative impact to service delivery, especially roads.
- Only people from Limpopo are winning tenders in Emfuleni and there is only one person doing the grass cutting.
- Concern over municipal vehicles doing private jobs all over.
- The problem of scrapyards and the need to stop them from growing.

Ward 44

- Concern over a house registered in 1996 yet there is no progress or response.

Responses by the MMC's

MMC Godoli

- She encouraged the ELM community to keep the environment clean
- EPWP's involves all departments, but it is true that some of these employees are not committed to their obligations.
- Regarding overtime, she said they had challenge with the staff because they were serving both Evaton and Sebokeng.
- She pleaded with the community to volunteer in the eradication of illegal dumping.

MMC Ranake

- Care workers, especially owners of crèche should be aware that they will be constantly visited to check if they comply with the law in the running of their centres. She appealed to them that they should attend meetings when invited; they should not be threatened by rumours that their crèches will be closed.
- Those who are not getting proper service from the clinics should take the nurses names and report them.
- Orphanages needs to be registered and their building should comply with the Health Act

MMC Radebe

- Cllr Radebe made the community members aware that ELM constantly interacts with Sports Council regarding sports development of their areas
- Regarding Truck in Tshepiso that is blocking the traffic, he requested the councillor to address the problem urgently
- Cllr Radebe outlined on the progress of erection of the courts next to the stadium. He explained the fencing done is part of phase one.
- He notified the community members that no alcohol will be allowed at the swimming pools, especially bottles. The facility is being used by children and swimming learning programmes takes place there.

Closing remark by the Executive Mayor

- Those who need food parcels should contact SASSA because it is its competency.
- She emphasised that tenders will not be issued to individuals and encouraged the women, youths and people with disabilities to work as teams, and those who have been given tenders and not delivering will be blacklisted.
- On the issue of title deeds, she said that she will consult the housing MEC for advice because it is more of a legal issue, she further told the community that the MEC is with the RDP houses audit.
- She said that she will go to Mr Paul Mashatile to discuss the alleged promise to fix houses as raised by one community member.
- Those who need assistance in acquiring the identity document, she said the Speaker will coordinate the process.
- On the issue of public meetings, she emphasised that only ward councillors have the right to call and address the public.
- The Executive Mayor disputed the claim that only ANC members are hired by the municipality.
- She made emphasis on the payment of municipal rates and taxes.

Meeting Adjourned at 18:15

MMC Mcera

- Cllr Mcera said Crime strategy has been adopted by the Council, which is a document that will be used to address crime.
- Potholes are also caused by the burning of tyres, he therefore urged the community to protest peacefully.
- Youth forums are located in the Mayors office and they assist to connect the youths with National Youth Fund.
- He emphasised that, local labour is not limited to a particular ward, but limited to Emfuleni Local Municipality boundaries.
- CPF has been launched
- Mobile policing is in place including 10 cars in 5 sectors. Two officers has been provided per sector

MMC Thulo

- Although ESKOM has its own jurisdiction, but if there is common challenge it meet with the municipality.
- Illegal connections have been disconnected previously in Debonair park but as soon as officials leave the community reconnect again. She promised that there will be some arrests in the future.
- Emfuleni vehicles that are all over the place should be reported, she requested the community to take the registration numbers of those vehicles in question.
- Cllr Thulo appealed to the community to save water because it's a scares resources

MMC Khubeka

- She warned the Illegal occupants of RDP houses that they are going to be evicted
- People should note that it is illegal to sell RDP houses
- In regards to foreigners occupying RDP houses, she said this happen because some of community members do them favours
- About 300 houses in Evaton are awaiting title deeds.
- She acknowledged the important role that community leaders are playing in assisting their communities, but warned the community that they cannot register houses to them.
- She proposed that, those with security companies to register on the Emfuleni data base to curb the use of Red Ants.

- The R170 million was for the purchase of electricity from Eskom. The MMC informed the community that Eskom annually raise its tariffs in April, while the council do it in July. He further said the community members should be aware that between May and July it's a high season, meaning there is more consumption of electricity as a result charges becomes high
- In explanation for the criteria to tender with the municipality, the community members were informed about the existence of the database. The companies were urged to Register in the database
- Regarding recruitments of people to work in projects, the MMC for corporate services said the municipality is in the process of contracting a recruitment company which will look at the employment matters.
- MMC for waste informed the community that household collection start from Monday to Saturday. She further announced the council intention to relaunch Restore Dignity, Feila Nwanyana programme. She said refuse bags will be provided to all household in the near future. She also requested the community to identify open spaces per ward which can be used as mini-dump stations
- MMC for water sanitation acknowledged the challenge of sewer spillage. She appealed to the community members not to pour wrong stuff in their drains because it causes blockages. Ward 27

- Dysfunctional high mast lights.
- Need for housing.

Ward 28

- High unemployment affecting the youth.
- Contractors failing to complete their work.
- Can contractors offer something towards social responsibility?
- Need for housing and sports facilities in Kanana.
- Not getting free units when buying electricity.
- Is there any guarantee that the reshuffling of the ELM Mayoral Committee will bring about change?
- Un-availability of electricity in Ext 7.
- No tarred roads.

Ward 31

- ELM not supporting emerging businesses.
- What will be the impact of the 2010/11 IDP document?
- Housing application done since 1998.

Ward 36

- Upgrading of electricity.
- NGO's need financial assistance.
- Transform dilapidated buildings into something useful for the community
- Need for roads in Boiketlong to make emergency services access easier.
- Development of parks.

4. Responses

Cir Thabane mentioned that there will be an electricity programme that will be given to the Councillors indicating what is to be done. He further said that, Eskom should provide electricity in Beverly Hills Ext 7 but claims to have no funds; therefore ELM will provide bridging funds to address the issue.

Cir Moepadira stated that parks have started but there was a challenge of privately owned land, however one park per region annually will be created through the 'Indalo Yethu' provincial programme. He further stated that housing issues will be addressed by the province and that Kanana is one of the priority areas.

Cir Vundisa stated that NGO's that is supported by ELM are those focusing on HIV/Aids and people are also assisted with business plans to access financial support.

The Executive Mayor stated that developers in Beverly Hills bought land and the contractors did not consult ELM, hence there are so many challenges. ELM need to have a meeting with Eskom for them to commit themselves that they will pay. He acknowledged that in the past mistakes were done of building houses without servicing the land. He further reiterated that 90 days programme has been developed and it will be placed in the local newspapers. The Executive Mayor encouraged the community to raise some of the issues through the hotline.

5. Closure

The meeting adjourned at 18h10.

- The community requested the municipality to assist in the formation of cooperatives.
- Concern was raised over the lack of progress on the hostel project which began in 2006, and littering was also a concern.

Ward 30

- Lack of projects in the ward.
- There is no grass cutting and waste is not collected.

- Bhekizulu project is taking forever.

- According to one of the community members, the land owner had freely donated the land to the in Boiketleng people, but it seemed like ELM does not want to develop it.
- Roads need to be graded.
- A request was made for the provision of electricity by the municipality.
- There is no infrastructure in Boiketlong
- A member of the community insisted that he will not vote in the coming elections because he does not benefit anything.

4. Questions, Inputs, Comments and Responses

Ward 11

- No collection of waste in Tshepiso phase 4.
- Concerns that rates and taxes are paid for RDP houses.

Ward 12

- ELM to workshop business people.
- Request for the progress of R2 million which was allocated for development in Kensington.

Ward 21

5. Responses

REPORT ON THE 2010/2011 BUSINESS BREAKFAST

10 MAY 2010

Purpose

The purpose of this event was to empower the business fraternity in and around Emfuleni by providing feedback and progress regarding the work done by the municipality, to identify issues of concern and alternative solutions, to strengthen the lines of communication in a notion of 'government meets business', to consult with all stakeholders on the IDP and annual budget and incorporate stakeholder inputs.

Background

This event was convened on the basis of creating a platform for the business fraternity both established and emerging enterprises to interact with the Mayor and identify areas of opportunity. Moreover the event is also positioned to draw experiences and the check how far we have gone in ensuring proper implementation of the commitments that have been made.

The Mayor indicated that in our next business meeting an undertaking should be made to also extend invitations to the institutions of higher learning in our area.

The Mayor also indicated that financial institutions like banks needed to be invited.

The Mayor further indicated that business needs to organise itself and identify their collective needs. They need to be formalized and registered. The Mayor then directed the LED department to ensure that all LED related programmes are intensified.

The Mayor said we need at some stage to consider the possibility of convening a workshop on PPP principles and their application.

The Mayor was concerned by the small number and slow pace of registered SMME's in the database of Emfuleni.

The Mayor sharply raised the issue of quality of jobs by contractors and also proposed a full workshop around this issue.

The Mayor said as the municipality, we would need to explore effective monitoring mechanism that would monitor the development of each project stage to its completion with the ward councilor signing off on the completed and quality of each project stage.

The Mayor asserted the point that Emfuleni is blessed with a rich history however very has been done to harness that history for the purposes of tourism and economic development.

The Mayor announced that Emfuleni master-plan is almost complete and its existence would help position Emfuleni on the correct developmental path and anticipate future development and long-term planning.

The Mayor raised the issue of maintenance plan as one of the key pillars in our budget and plans especially in the height of rising youth unemployment.

The Mayor expressed a sad view that with all our efforts, the balance of evidence seems to suggest that we are making a small and limited dent of the backlogs.

The Mayor also expressed that a land audit is being undertaken and a moratorium on the sale of land has been placed subject to this investigation.

Emfuleni has received a blue-drop status on the quality of water purification.

The Mayor announced that in the coming month the MEC will kick-start a process of signing performance agreement with the Premier.

Discussion

The delegation expressed a view that they want to see more intensified development in townships and maximum use of local contractors to develop and nurture the entrepreneurial spirit in the area and the regions.

The business delegations wanted to see urgent skills audit of Emfuleni as they see a mismatch of skills leading to irregularities with the capacity of staff especially supply chain management and the budget office.

Delegation was worried about critical vacancies that are taking far too long to be filled.

Conclusion

The 2010/11 IDP/Budget Business Breakfast meeting has taking place under the context of the tough economic conditions. However, despite these conditions; it is commendable to see that our municipality has indicated a substantial increase in local economic activities. The following were key issues that formed the basis for the meeting:

1. **Opening and Welcome**

Cllr Ranake (Chairperson) opened the meeting officially. She then introduced the Executive Mayor of Emfuleni Local Municipality, the members of the Mayoral Committee, Councillors and officials. Cllr Ruele welcomed everyone present.

He described democracy as the government by the people for the people. He commented on the CDW's role in the community. He also encouraged the formation of organized groups and sub-committees in the community for the purpose of working together with the Municipality.

- Suggest that CDW's and Ward Committees's work performance be monitored by Mayor's office.
- Bad road conditions in phase 4
- Concerned about lost subsidies

- Dangerous open channel in van Riebeeck street

Ward 21

- Highmast lights not working
- Need for housing
- No parks in Debonaire Park
- Need for homeowner education, particularly when the house owner makes renovations.
- Community members are not acquainted with by-laws

Closing Remark by the Executive Mayor

- She emphasised that people should not stop the projects, if there are problems people should come to her office.
- All issues of housing such as title deeds will be forwarded to the MMC Manana, who is currently unavailable.
- By-Laws will be effective to fight illegal dumping
- Ward Councillors were encouraged to form steering committees to oversee projects.
- The metropolitan will come into effect by 2016, as it is still in the process; therefore every budget is prior the metro.
- The municipality has encountered problems regarding housing; however, audit is being conducted to address the challenge.
- By not voting people are not punishing us, but they are denying their own rights.

Clr Pitso said the ELM is aware about Rust-ter-Vaal housing issue and they are dealing with it. He said the water logged houses were built in a flood line and that plans are underway to relocate people from that area. He encouraged community members to report any form of corruption to the municipality offices.

Clr Vundisa said the request will be made to the Province for the extension of clinic.

Clr Moepadira mentioned that the issue of housing in Rust-ter-Vaal is noted and he and his team will visit the area in two weeks time. He dismissed the rumours about lost subsidies and assured the community members that the normal process of allocation of houses continues. He articulated his awareness of Vereeniging Hospital that was on fire and they presently busy writing a report regarding the incident, although the place will no longer be appropriate to continue as a dwelling.

Clr Thabane said all the manholes will from this time forth be closed with cement.

5. Closure

The Executive Mayor in his closing remark highlighted that it is his wish that every ward have its own park, for that reason he invited proposals from the community members for the development of parks. He also encouraged business and other stakeholders to adopt some of those parks. He explained to the community members that the municipality purchase water and electricity therefore it is imperative to pay for services.

FACT SHEET ON OPERATION KHANYISA CAMPAIGN APPROACH AND STRATEGY

Operation Khanyisa is based on a social marketing approach that aims to drive voluntary behaviour change in a sustainable manner. Whilst advertising, public relations and other traditional communication channels are used, the campaign differs fundamentally from traditional advertising and communication campaigns both in its approach and implementation.

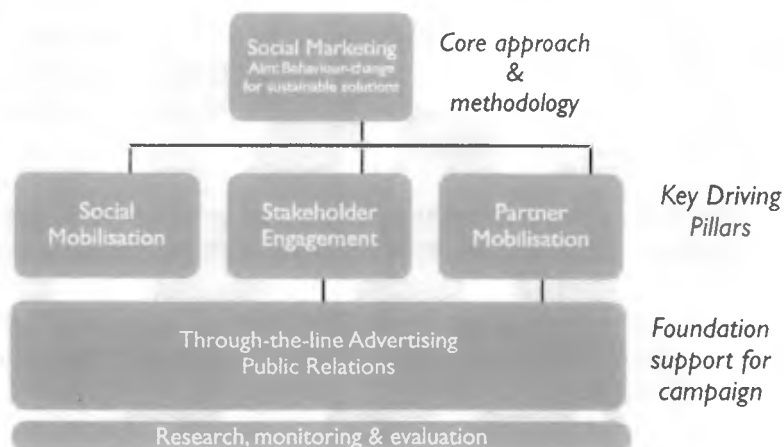
Social marketing in this context refers to an approach that involves applying commercial and innovative marketing technologies in behaviour-change programmes, with the aim of influencing the voluntary behaviour of target audiences for the greater good of the individual and society, whilst also doing the most good for the company or organisation concerned.

The challenge faced in behaviour-change campaigns such as Operation Khanyisa is very different to commercial advertising. As one writer on the subject has put it: It's the difference between selling someone a Ferrari and persuading them to drive it within the speed limit!

This requires a much deeper understanding of the process of behaviour change, what's needed and how to guide the target audience through the journey to achieve the desired behaviour. The desired behaviours targeted by Operation Khanyisa include:

- Becoming compliant and using electricity legally
- Reporting (faulty meters, defaulters, etc)
- Being ambassadors/advocates for legal electricity use
- Being partners in driving a sustainable solution

Operation Khanyisa's target audiences include large and small power users, residential power users, stakeholders, organised civil society, employees in the electricity industry, municipalities and contractors. The diagram below outlines the channels used by the campaign to reach these target audiences:





FACT SHEET ON ESKOM'S ENERGY LOSSES MANAGEMENT PROGRAMME (ELP) AND ENERGY LOSSES

What are energy losses?

Electricity utilities around the world constantly face the pressure of reducing operational costs while also improving the quality and reliability of supply. Energy losses contribute considerably to operating costs, thereby impacting future network planning and design strategies for the utility. Compounding the energy loss situation is the increasing motivation from customers, stemming from rising energy prices, to reduce their electricity bill by illegal methods. Thus energy losses comprise a significant portion of the utility's revenue loss, which in turn, greatly impacts its bottom line. Eskom too is not immune to the impact of energy theft related issues.

Energy losses have increased almost linearly between 2002 and 2005. To combat this challenge, Eskom has initiated the Energy Losses Management Programme (ELP) in 2006, to vigorously investigate and address the problem. Eskom is regarded as one of the leading power companies in the world regarding control of losses, consistently being placed amongst the world's top 25% in controlling these losses.

Energy losses are defined as the difference between energy purchased from Transmission and energy sold by Eskom Distribution.

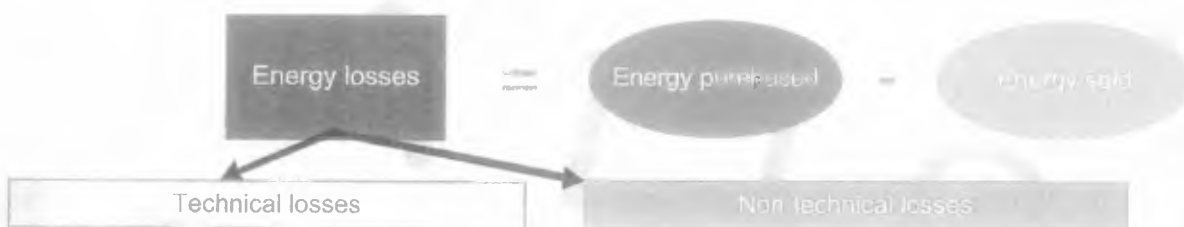


Figure 1: Technical and Non-technical losses

Total energy losses are made up of Technical and Non-technical losses.

- Technical losses are related to equipment, e.g. energy dissipated in the conductors and equipment used for distribution of power.
- Non-technical losses on the other hand stem from issues such as defective meters, electricity theft, tampering with, or bypassing meters.



To date, millions have been prevented from being lost to the business as a result of the fixes done on problems identified from April 2007 to date. In addition, the ELP Revenue Recovery process has assisted the business to also re-bill a vast amount in the last financial year.

Ring Fence Work stream

The ring-fence work stream use electrical networks to balance energy and focuses on identification of network boundaries, installing statistical meters to measure energy flows, and to balance energy inflows and outflows so that all anomalies can be identified. Results of statistical meter installations and feeder balancing data are also measured on the ELP scorecard, to ensure timeous installation and accurate data and reporting.

Remote statistical metering coverage of all Distribution networks are essential in order to measure and account for the energy flows on the networks. Plans are in place for improvements in statistical metering coverage of the Distribution networks. Implementation of these plans is currently in progress. ELP has played a critical role in prioritising, fast tracking as well as securing financial assistance for the Regional executions. Statistical metering installation plans were exceeded at Distribution level in the last two financial years.

The reconciliation of energy distributed versus the revenue received from the customers needs to be actively carried out through means of energy balancing initiatives. Significant strides have been made in the energy balancing and feeder balancing domains in the business over the last few years.

The number of feeders balanced has drastically increased in the last two financial years as well. The focus and drive currently is on ensuring improvement in the data accuracy of feeder balancing to help target high loss feeders and areas. Pro-active analysis to determine the high loss areas within Eskom's supply areas is frequently carried out to focus and direct energy loss reduction activities in those problem areas.

Technology Work stream

The implemented tested technologies work stream focuses on investigating technology options to reduce energy losses, piloting and testing these technologies and measuring the benefits.



FACT SHEET ON OPERATION KHANYISA CAMPAIGN NAME

Operation Khanyisa is a campaign for legal power use. Khanyisa is a Zulu word that means to enlighten or light up.

There are other movements that have used the name Operation Khanyisa to encourage illegal power use.

So, why did we choose the same name for our campaign?

Simple. Subversion. We want to turn their campaign on its head.

Our campaign is the REAL Operation Khanyisa. Our campaign really does enlighten people by empowering them with information about electricity and helping communities on the road to a better life.

We want to take those who encourage electricity theft head-on and prove that there is nothing 'enlightening' about electricity theft.

Illegal connections may bring light, but may also contribute to power outages, cause deaths and injuries, and can contribute to rising prices and job losses.

Our campaign provides communities with the correct information about electricity, how to use it legally, safely and responsibly – both in the interests of individuals, households and the broader community.

If you are asking why our campaign is called Operation Khanyisa when others use this name to drive illegal power use, then it shows our strategy is already working. This is exactly what we want to achieve. We want communities to question the intention of those who encourage illegal acts and yet say they are 'enlightening' the people. Pass the message on. This is the REAL Operation Khanyisa.

So, why is it called an 'operation'?

Historically, during the struggle against apartheid, communities and organisations used the word 'operation' to describe a mobilisation approach to get things done! This is why we called this an 'operation' and not simply a project or a campaign. The intention is to mobilise the people against electricity theft. No single organisation can tackle electricity theft on its own. It needs a movement for legal power use.

In short, our campaign is the REAL Operation Khanyisa. It stands for legal power use.



FACT SHEET ON OPERATION KHANYISA SUB-CAMPAIGN FOR ENHANCED ENFORCEMENT IN THE DRIVE TO DEAL WITH ELECTRICITY THEFT

Whilst Operation Khanyisa is designed to drive voluntary behaviour change, it recognises that a strong element of enforcement is also needed for an effective campaign. Enforcement in this instance refers to the process of taking relevant legal action to compel offenders to comply with their obligations and where necessary, to request the State to initiate an investigation and a prosecution.

One of the problems regarding prosecution of electricity theft in South Africa is the absence of an appropriate legislative framework. The Electricity Act of 1987 has been replaced but the new Electricity Regulation Act of 2006 still falls short in several crucial areas. There is no clear definition of electricity theft and whilst certain municipalities have passed by-laws addressing these gaps, Eskom is not able to make use of these regulations for its own purposes. A legislative review is underway and new legislation is expected shortly. The new draft legislation also includes higher penalties for offenders once convicted.

Whilst the legislative process is underway, the short-term strategy is to intensify common law prosecutions and legal opinions have been obtained to improve the use of common law in cases of electricity theft. The longer-term strategy is to set legal precedents and leverage legislation such as the Prevention of Organised Crime Act (POCA) for more serious offenders. A crucial part of Operation Khanyisa's enforcement strategy is to improve reporting of electricity theft in partnership with Primedia Crime Line and SAPS (see separate fact sheet) and to strengthen capacity in Eskom and the criminal justice system.

Much of the initial detection and investigation of electricity theft takes place in Eskom, and specialists brought in as part of Operation Khanyisa are developing improved investigation methodologies and case management systems.

A closer relationship between SAPS, NPA and Eskom is also being forged to ensure joint problem-solving, information-sharing and centralised monitoring and tracking of cases. Discussions have also taken place with the Hawks to deal with high priority cases.



FACT SHEET ON RESEARCH CONDUCTED FOR OPERATION KHANYISA ON PERCEPTIONS, BEHAVIOURS AND ATTITUDES TOWARDS ELECTRICITY THEFT AND RELATED TOPICS

Because of the objective to achieve large-scale behaviour change, extensive and specialised research is one of the key activities in the Operation Khanyisa campaign against electricity theft. The first wave of research was conducted during the period February to July 2010 by an independent research house. The objective is to understand where target audiences are in the process of behaviour change, to inform the strategic approach and to track progress as the campaign unfolds.

The research consisted of the following surveys:

1. A national baseline survey with a representative sample of 2 387 households;
2. A survey of the six pilot sites – survey sample of 870 households and 6 focus groups involving 60 participants;
3. Interviews with stakeholders (54 interviews), Large Power Users (50 interviews) and non-residential Small Power Users (100 interviews) – conducted with CEOs and managers of randomly selected companies; and
4. An Eskom employee survey – random sample of 300 Distribution Division employees, and 8 focus groups involving 89 participants.

The research investigated areas such as demographics and household characteristics relevant to the campaign, awareness and knowledge of electricity theft, attitudes and beliefs about electricity theft, behaviour related to electricity theft, attitudes and perceptions towards the electricity crisis and Eskom, and awareness, attitudes and perceptions to the campaign itself. The research consisted of questionnaires, focus groups and interviews.

Some of the key findings are:

- There is a general awareness of the problem of electricity theft, but there is a strong misperception that the problem is limited to townships and informal settlements;
- Participants are generally knowledgeable about the various methods of stealing electricity;



FACT SHEET ON ENHANCING REPORTING BY THE PUBLIC IN SUPPORT OF OPERATION KHANYISA AND LEGAL POWER USE

The general approach taken by Operation Khanyisa is to drive voluntary behaviour change and persuade South Africans to join the movement for legal power use. However, the reality is that enforcement is also needed if electricity theft is to be dealt with effectively. The silence and inaction of the general citizenry condones deviant behaviour and creates the operating space for criminals to perpetrate their offences. One of the key objectives of Operation Khanyisa is to break this silence and to mobilise South Africans for legal power use. One of the key avenues in which people can play an active role, is by being the eyes and ears for the campaign and to report suspicious behaviour or offences being committed.

Best practice has shown that the key to a successful reporting facility is that it should be seen as being independent, enjoy high credibility, have a solid reputation, ensures action taken on tip-offs received, and provides regular feedback on results achieved/action taken. For this reason, Operation Khanyisa has partnered with one of the most successful crime reporting initiatives in the country, Primedia Crime Line.

Crime Line has won the trust of the South African public and has been internationally recognised for its success in achieving higher crime reporting by members of the public. Part of the success of Crime Line lies in the fact that it is an independent operation that protects the anonymity of those who report crime.

Electricity theft can be reported anonymously by sending an SMS to 32211. Costs are R1/SMS. Tip-offs can also be submitted on www.crimeline.co.za It is important that certain details are included when reporting a suspected incident of electricity theft, such as:

- Address of the crime or description of the place;
- Description and name of suspect if it is known;
- Nature of the crime if possible, e.g. illegal connection, meter tampering, cable theft, etc.

Ward 25

- Sanco said they are noting the projects listed in the Draft IDP, but they are not happy about the municipality services
- Concerned that the newly established old age home is not recognized by a councillor

Responses by MMC's

- Clr Pitso said the issue of old age home was noted and it will be investigated.
- He said speed humps request has been received and noted; nevertheless he condemned the act of damage of public properties because people were angry during the protests march. He appealed to the car drivers to abide by the traffic rules when they driving in the township.
- In response to an issue of allocation of maintenance funds, he said the money allocated for grass cutting is still small since it has to be used to cater the whole of Emfuelni
- Backyard rooms are done by Housing Departments and the ones which are seen in Boipotong are a Pilot Project. It is only when it has been tested that is working then it will be rolled out to all townships
- Clr Mabandla said when the council urge the community members to pay for the municipality services; it is referred particularly to those who are working. Those who do not work are encouraged to come and register as indigents

Closing Remark by Executive Mayor

She urged the community members to drive safely in the township and observe roads rules and the speed humps request were noted. She encouraged community members to attend meetings called by councillors. The Executive Mayor said foreigners are welcomed in our community but they should work legally with permits. The need for shopping centre is also noted.

She thanked everyone for attending the meeting and requested one community member to close the meeting in prayer

FACT SHEET ON ELECTRICITY THEFT AND OPERATION KHANYISA

- Drive through South Africa's towns, cities, rural areas and one sees an all too familiar sight... spider webs of entangled illegal connections to 'source' electricity.
- Fingers invariably point to townships and informal settlements as the main culprits who steal electricity. However, even business, commerce and agriculture are among those involved in electricity theft.
- Often very innovative and sophisticated; sometimes basic and blatant - the practice of electricity theft is rife through illegal connections, meter tampering, bypassing of meters, stolen credit dispensing units (CDUs) and illegal electrification schemes.
- Even employees and contractors in the electricity industry contribute to electricity theft by:
 - o Knowing, seeing, hearing fellow employees, contractors, members of the public, etc engaging in this criminal behaviour, and choosing not to report these perpetrators, turning a blind eye - through silence and inaction, condoning this criminal behaviour.
 - o Being among the culprits and enriching themselves through:
 - Either assisting businesses, farmers and residents to steal electricity by carrying out illegal connections and meter tampering for a fee in their pockets; or
 - 'Advising' on how to do illegal connections or bypass meters – also for a 'fee'
- Electricity theft is a serious problem – for Eskom, municipalities, business and industry, communities and residents and for South Africa as a whole. Electricity theft from Eskom and municipalities amounts to around R4.4 billion a year. This impacts on future economic growth and sustainability, the quality and stability of electricity supply, and government's electrification program.
- Due to the fact that illegal users believe that they are getting "free electricity" there is no incentive for them to use electricity responsibly and efficiently. This can lead to overloading and instability of the electricity network, especially during times of supply restraints and may lead to power outages, etc.
- And last, but certainly not least, the cost to human life and wellbeing is incalculable. Death or serious injury is often the result of illegal connections. Innocent people



BRIEFING DOCUMENT ON ELECTRICITY THEFT AND OPERATION KHANYISA

Drive through South Africa's towns, cities, rural areas and one could see an all too familiar sight; spider webs of entangled illegal connections to 'source' electricity. Fingers invariably point to the 'settlements' as the culprits who steal electricity. However, businesses and organisations in the commercial and agricultural sectors are among the main culprits that dabble in the practice of electricity theft. Often very innovative and sophisticated, and sometimes basic and blatant, the criminal practice of illegal connections, meter tampering, bypassing of meters, illegal vending and even illegal electrifications is widespread.

Employees in the electricity industry and contractors are often part of the problem - trying to enrich themselves by assisting businesses, farmers and residents to steal electricity by doing illegal connections and meter tampering. There are even those who 'advise' on how to steal electricity by hooking up illegal connections and tampering with the meter.

Electricity theft is a serious problem – for Eskom, South Africa, business and industry, communities and residents. Electricity theft impacts future economic growth and sustainability, as well as the quality and stability of electricity supply.

The Minister of Energy, Dipuo Peters, recently highlighted the cost of electricity theft to the country when she said that power theft cost Eskom and Municipalities at least R4 billion in 2009. The impact on government's electrification target of 100% access by 2012 is serious. Conservatively speaking, approximately 5 000 Gwh were stolen in 2009.

The further effects of power theft are many:

- Illegal connections impact the stability of the national grid and can lead to power outages; a problem encountered numerous times in the past.
- Due to the fact that electricity is "free" for those who steal, there is no incentive to save and this leads to overloading, further increasing the risk of power outages leading to inconvenience and losses running into billions of rands.
- Last, but certainly not least, the cost to human life and wellbeing is incalculable. Death or serious injury is often the result of illegal connections. Innocent people, often children, pay the ultimate price for another individual's illegal behaviour. Most people know that electricity is dangerous but not many realise that most deaths and injuries caused by electricity are a result of illegal connections.

- The essence of the strategy is built on two integrated pillars aimed at achieving a sustainable strategy with substance and impact.

Objective: Behaviour-change towards legal electricity usage



Activities to date include:

- Baseline research with communities in pilot sites, Eskom employees and a national baseline study
- The campaign itself commenced earlier this year with a presence at the NAMPO festival during May in Bothaville. Eskom worked closely with AgriSA during this activation to drive home the message that electricity theft does not pay.
- An internal employee campaign blitz in April 2010 followed in four sites around Johannesburg.

Electricity theft is not an Eskom problem. It is a problem faced by the country as whole. The challenge that electricity theft represents can therefore only be tackled in a national partnership approach and it is for this reason that Operation Khanyisa commenced with a drive to recruit core partners to the campaign. These core partners cut across the private and public sector: Proudly South African (Proudly SA), Business Unity SA (BUSU), Business Against Crime (BAC), Primedia Crime Line, the South African Local Government Association (SALGA) and Eskom.

These core partners who lend their brands, voice and presence to Operation Khanyisa ensure a strong national drive, reaching a range of diverse constituencies involving business, media, crime prevention and local government.

The campaign is however not limited to these organisations and we invite other organisations to join us as strategic and/or operational partners. Other strategic partners and parties that expressed interest in the campaign include AgriSA, Media 24, Telkom, the South African Revenue Protection Association (SARPA), the Association of Municipal Electricity Undertakings (AMEU) and SHOUT SA. The South African Police Service (SAPS) and National Prosecuting Authority (NPA) also support the campaign.

The partnership campaign includes close consultation with partners on a regular basis for purposes of information sharing and problem-solving. These structured engagements ensure that all partners are kept up to date on developments, and that the campaign is able to make use of their platforms and constituencies to broaden the reach of the Operation Khanyisa message.

Partner organisations will soon receive regular on-line updates and newsletters, and special briefing sessions are to be arranged with various structures within their organisations.

The transfer station which is developed but not collected on a regular basis also creates unhygienic condition within the area.

Ms. Ramaelle, indicate that the department has challenges with fleet and therefore has a backlog and struggles to provide a sustainable service in the area. Than this community is not the only affected area, but the whole ELM is affected by the fleet situation.

She however indicated that they are pulling plugs to ensure that the basic service is provided.

6.3. Meter Audit and Meter readings

The meeting received a detailed reports from Mr. Maimane. The following status quo was presented.

The reported also indicated that there were about 111 alleged no access due to gate locked incidents. Seven meter were removed and 11 meters were replaced during the period under review.

The meeting noted the report after some discussions it was noted that there was conflicting views about the status quo and it was resolved that the involvement of the community reps be improved to ensure buy-in and understanding of the process.

The report also indicated that after the readings of the 23 JANUARY 2015, The accounts will be given to Mantsie to start work on the water recalculations and adjustments where necessary.

6.4. Possible Adjustments: Financial Implications

Ms. Mabote presented a report whereby she took the meeting in confidence about what was done of a sample of accounts which did not have meter query related problems. She indicated the process followed and what was done to arrive at the prospective possible prescription which could be allocated provided the Council will give approval.

The meeting noted the report and thanks her for the work.

7. Closure

The meeting agreed that the next meeting will be held on Tuesday, 10 February 2015 at 09:00

The meeting continued in the absence of the chair that had to attend a funeral, the outstanding to be discussed was the Indigent Registration Process.

Criteria for qualification

- Household should apply to the municipality
- Should be unemployed
- Child headed
- State welfare grant recipients
- Minimum household income should not be more than R3500, and determined by Council from time to time

Criteria for qualification continued

- Should be residing within the jurisdiction of the municipality
- Should be the legal owner of the property
- Should not own more than one property
- Tenants also qualify (as per Indigent policy)

Whose responsibility is it to determine an indigent

- Social development is responsible for indigent verification and screening process through the diligent work of Social Workers and Field workers
- Ward Councilors need to confirm information on the application form and **must** sign the application form

CHALLENGES

- Minimal response from applicants when called in to finalize their applications
- Applicants unable to access their Ward Councilors
- Clients giving false information to staff

Challenges continued

- Tenants become disadvantaged because of using the owner's account number
- Those without account numbers are not benefiting
- BCX the service provider not consistent
- Applicants remain on the indigent register forever
- Database not a true reflection

Indigent Burial

Who qualifies

Emfuleni residents **excluding foreigners** who :

- do not have any means of burying their deceased

Pauper Burial

Who is a pauper

A person:

- who died as unknown,
- whose body is not claimed,
- whose family, friends can not be traced for a period of 6 weeks to identify or to bury the body,

Procedure to assist families on Indigent burial

- The ward Councillor must write a letter declaring that the family of the deceased is indigent & the letter is submitted to ELM Dept of Social Development,
- The ward Councillor's letter must be accompanied by an affidavit from the family member

Procedure to assist families on Indigent burial continued

stating his/her relationship with the deceased and that they are unable to bury

- ELM Social Development then allocates the case to the Social Worker for investigation

Procedure to assist families on Indigent burial continued

- The relevant documentation together with a report from Social Development is referred to the contracted funeral undertaker(Konyana Funeral Directors)
- All indigent burials are conducted from Monday to Thursday

- Concern over irregularities on the employment selection process at the fire station.
- Illegitimate tender processes that have a negative impact to service delivery, especially roads.
- Only people from Limpopo are winning tenders in Emfuleni and there is only one person doing the grass cutting.
- Concern over municipal vehicles doing private jobs all over.
- The problem of scrapyards and the need to stop them from growing.

Ward 44

- Concern over a house registered in 1996 yet there is no progress or response.

Responses by the MMC's

MMC Godoli

- She encouraged the ELM community to keep the environment clean
- EPWP's involves all departments, but it is true that some of these employees are not committed to their obligations.
- Regarding overtime, she said they had challenge with the staff because they were serving both Evaton and Sebokeng.
- She pleaded with the community to volunteer in the eradication of illegal dumping.

MMC Ranake

- Care workers, especially owners of crèche should be aware that they will be constantly visited to check if they comply with the law in the running of their centres. She appealed to them that they should attend meetings when invited; they should not be threatened by rumours that their crèches will be closed.
- Those who are not getting proper service from the clinics should take the nurses names and report them.
- Orphanages needs to be registered and their building should comply with the Health Act

MMC Radebe

- Cllr Radebe made the community members aware that ELM constantly interacts with Sports Council regarding sports development of their areas
- Regarding Truck in Tshepiso that is blocking the traffic, he requested the councillor to address the problem urgently
- Cllr Radebe outlined on the progress of erection of the courts next to the stadium. He explained the fencing done is part of phase one.
- He notified the community members that no alcohol will be allowed at the swimming pools, especially bottles. The facility is being used by children and swimming learning programmes takes place there.

Services provided

The contracted funeral undertaker provides the following:

- Storage
- Standing wood coffin
- Transportation of the deceased to the grave (hearse)
- Grave
- Death certificate
- The undertaker is paid R2550.00 per indigent burial

Services provided continued

and R1600.00 per pauper burial

- Burial of the deceased is at a designated grave and cemetery indicated by service provider

NB!!

The designated ELM official must ensure that all the abovementioned procedures and requirements are met before an order could be placed at the contracted funeral undertaker

Important notes regarding indigent burial

ELM does not:

- Provide transportation for the mourners,
- Catering for burial,
- Take responsibility for any assistance of any kind from any body if the conditions as set out above are not acceptable for any other reason .

CHALLENGES

- Sometimes the service is being abused clients apply for the services whilst they do not qualify
- Applicants apply for indigent burial and later used the death certificate of the deceased to make claims from insurance

CHALLENGES CONTINUED

- Most of the community members are not aware of this service hence they remain with unburied corpses for long
- When corpses are taken by non contracted undertakers it becomes a problem for the family when they have to remove the body

Helping Hand For Families Of Slain Police Officers



The families of 40 police officers, killed in the line of duty, have benefited from moneys raised by Crime Line for the Police Widows and Orphans Fund. Inspired by Lead SA, Crime Line raised over R2.1-million for the fund during a radiothon hosted by Primedia Broadcasting's four radio stations - Talk Radio 702, 567 Cape Talk, 94.7 Highveld Stereo and 94.5 Kfm - and the Independent Group of Newspapers. The fund has paid out a total amount of over R1.5 million to families of police officers who were murdered in the line of duty and not members of the fund. The project was launched in re-

sponse to the escalating number of police killings and the need to provide some relief to the families of slain police officers. These officers made the ultimate sacrifice to serve and protect our communities. It was imperative to us that we acknowledge this sacrifice by also recognising the loss of the families and the severe financial strain of losing a breadwinner," said Head of Crime Line, Yusuf Abramjee. The Widows and Orphans Fund indicated that the balance of the funds, which total over half a million rand, will continue to be paid out to the families of slain police officers. "We have agreed with the fund that the terms

of our agreements will change slightly to include police officers who died in the line of duty from other causes, including motor vehicle accidents," said fund chairman, Lieutenant-General K. Craemer.

The family of Constable Reservist Busisive Mehilwana is one of the beneficiaries. She was gunned down during an ATM bombing attack in Pimville, Soweto in July 2011. Money was also paid out to the family of Lieutenant-Colonel Mark Ishlove who died during a shoot out with a gang of robbers in Northcliff, Johannesburg in June 2011.

"We know that this money will never replace nor bring back their loved-ones, but the intention was to offer support the families of our fallen heroes," said Abramjee.

The Widows and Orphans Fund released the names of the Crime Line project beneficiaries are forty six families and orphans. Crime Line thanked every member of the public who pledged money towards this project, including major companies.

"Companies such as the Sizwe I' Group, the SHOUT Foundation, Dischem, Investec and the Vodacom Foundation helped to push the numbers up. Their

contribution has made a great difference. We thank you for your support," said Abramjee.

On behalf of the fund, Lt. General Craemer, also added his voice of thanks to members of the public who supported the Crime Line project. "Every rand will benefit someone. We thank Crime Line for the support. The funds distribution has and will make a difference." Crime Line urged members of the public and companies to continue supporting the work of the Police Widows and Orphans Fund. "The fund is entirely dependent on donations, but despite this they offer

their members peace of mind. They do great work and they have been excellent partners throughout this project," said Abramjee.

"Yes there are bad apples in the police, but there are also good and dedicated officers who put their lives on the line to serve and protect us. It makes a great difference to enable credible organisations to give a helping hand to the families who are left behind," said Abramjee.

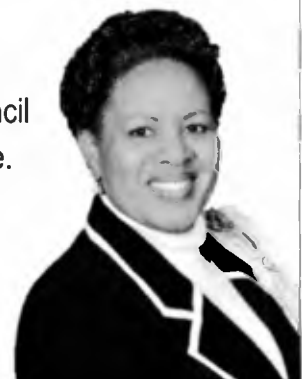

- She acknowledged the important role that community leaders are playing in assisting their communities, but warned the community that they cannot register houses to them.
- She proposed that, those with security companies to register on the Emfuleni data base to curb the use of Red Ants.

Closing remark by the Executive Mayor

- There is a new policy for indigents .It states that if a community member owns a house that cost R150 thousands upward, he or she should pay rates and taxes. Valuation will be done soon and if people are in that category and not working they should register as indigents
- Regarding family fights for the house, it is not the competency of the municipality to intervene. People are encouraged to draw wills regarding their assets.
- The proposal to pay flat rate of R200 is not acceptable because that money will not be sufficient to address issues of service delivery

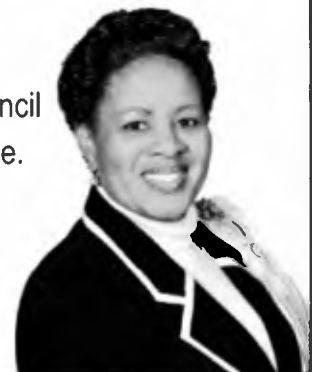

Opening and Welcome

The Programme Director Cllr Khoali requested one member of the community to open the meeting in prayer, she then welcomed everyone present. Cllr Malindi introduced the executive Mayor, Members of Mayoral Committee and the Councillors.

Purpose of the meeting

Cllr Pitso articulated that as a government for the people by the people, it is crucial that interests be taken on the community. He said it is a legislative requirement that the community becomes involved in the municipality planning. He said that the

Executive Mayor was there to report on the implementation of 2011/12 projects and feedback on the issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation meetings. Cfr Pitso emphasized the importance of the relationship that the community, Council and Administration should have as legislated by MSA. Lastly he thanked the community members who have been paying for their municipal services and encouraged them to continue to do so.

Presentation by the Executive Mayor

The Executive mayor in her opening remark introduced The Acting Municipal Manager, senior management team members and other officials. She expressed her disappointment on the illegal connection of electricity at Kwa Masiza. The Mayor spoke about the provision of 6kl free water to Indigents', but they should be aware that immediately they use more than that they will pay from 7kl. She advised community members to report leaking taps in order to save water. It's a responsibility of the owner of the house to fix any sewer pipes in the yard; the council is responsible for the ones in the street.

Discussions and questions

Ward 2

- Concerned that ELM reports are questionable in terms of financial viability
- Waterval, it's a busy road, it was suggested that the speed limit be increased to avoid issuing of unnecessary traffic tickets,
- There is no progress on the development of hostels into family units
- Need High for High Mast Lights
- Early Childhood Centre is needed
- Not all school patrollers are being paid
- Parents should be encouraged to stop buying expensive phones for their children and neglecting to pay municipal services

Ward 17

- No progress regarding Western development

Ward 27

- Need to know when the construction of clinic and library start
- It's been long awaiting for RDP houses
- Suggested that By –Laws be functional (Air Pollution)
- There is Electricity cuts without prior warning
- Unpleasant Odour from Sebokeng Water Works
- Houses in Boitumelo are too small
- Bad Soil
- Bad conditions of Roads
- Proposed that locally people be hired during constructions or implementation of other projects

Ward 28

- Clinics, roads and solar geysers were promised but nothing happened

- No schools in Sonderwater, as a result number of children have to cross Golden High way to reach other schools
- Tshwaranag project had represented ELM in a competition and won a prize of R300 thousand, but project members were never acknowledged nor give them something.
- According to one of the community members, the land owner had freely donated the land to the in Boiketleng people, but it seemed like ELM does not want to develop it
- Drainage pipes erected to drain water for water logged houses and streets were not installed properly and they discharge white substance
- There are problems with sewer drainages in the yards and for Lekoa to attend to it one needs to pay R150
- Houses are built in Wet land area
- Proposed that soil be checked before houses are built

Ward 30

- In 1995 residents of Sebokeng were told that their debt of the municipality service will be cancelled, but it came as a surprise as to an old age when she received the statements that she owes R5000
- As a plumber without qualification papers would like to offer services to the community since Metsi a lekoe are not attending to people complains in time.
- Barcodes were placed in the houses to mark houses that were going to be extended with two backrooms, since awaiting the action
- Youth are employed but not paid by contractors
- There are Illegal occupants in RDP houses, while some are threatened to be evicted from their shacks in the area and they are holding form C
- People have receiving accounts from Eskom, when they are queried they say that is the money they are owed by Emfuleni
- There is no account on money won at Botho ke Bontle competition
- Community members were coerced to pay R500 for the cancellation of debt owing to the municipality
- In the BOT meeting the councillor announced that R30 million rands has been set aside for the building of houses, but nothing has happened
- In zone 16 the councillor coerced the elderly people to fill the forms without explaining its purpose or providing full information
- Housing roof is wobbly and the council ever since promised to fix it

Ward 32

- Need for title Deeds

Ward 34

- Water logged houses in Tshabatsatsi zone 11
- Youth involved in crime activities, need to create job creations plan

Ward 35

- No Councillor Visibility
- The street from Monyaka in Mampoi is being reconstructed many times

Ward 36

- There is a pipe that has busted next to Moloantoe garage and has not been attended.
- During rainy seasons when one flush toilet water remains up and standstill
- Water logged Street next to Moloantoe garage
- There is no infrastructure in Boiketlong
- There is highly rate of robbery and theft
- There are preferential when coming to allocation of RDP houses in New Village, New people are approved first
- Its been long being in a housing waiting lists

Responses by MMC's

MMC Radebe

- Clr Radebe said the issue of ward 27 regarding promised library is on the pipeline. He made community members that ELM together the provincial department have done some tours in Boiketlong and Boitumelo.
- Regarding the land handed over to the community, it should be noted that everybody claimed the ownership of that land in Boitumelo. The owner should approach ELM office with his title deeds.
- The ground in ward 36 was assessed by the municipality; the place is not suitable to become a play ground. It has been illegally occupied.
- The church never requested or claimed the ground, they have illegally occupied place

MMC Khubeka

- Clr Khubeka said title deeds are issued in Houtkop
- Regarding housing issue in zone 30, she explained the process of housing application starting with Form C to application for subsidy for building a house.
- The connection of pipes is in place and people will be contacted on a progress
- The bar coding of houses was a project of 20PTP. After it was piloted in Boipatong, ELM requested the province to roll it out in other areas.
- She requested that the land claimer called Johnny to contact ELM to discuss the issue of land (in ward 36)
- The people raised the issues of being contracted must see DMM(EDP)
- Housing department in ELM is trying their level best to allocate houses to number of people in the waiting list
- The issue of pipes discharging the white substance will be attended together with province
- Community members should be aware that feasibility studies are conducted before houses are built.
- Investigation will be made on people who applied for houses from 2010 and are being allocated prior to the 2007 applications
- Bonds houses are not the responsibility of the municipality

MMC Ronyuza

- Outlined the results of Auditor general reports for ELM, which started as disclaimer now qualified. This was to dismiss misconceptions and misinterpretations of those results as read in the media.
- Revenue manager is currently making plans to conduct workshops on Masakhane
- Clr Ronyuza announced that statements were sent to the community that show the amount they owe to the municipality for services. The community members are urged to pay and those who are not working to register as indigents.

MMC Malindi

- Clr Malindi said doors are opened for the community to share their ideas regarding job creation with the council. He acknowledged the good work done by food garden project members. He said the council is aware about the issue of land and meeting with the project management will continue.

MMC Godoli

- Clr Godili said she was not aware that the trucks for waste they don't enter zone 24, therefore the matter will be followed up. She explained to the community members that the money won for Bontle ke Botho competition is used for wards projects. Business plans should be submitted first before the money can be released to the wards.

MMC Thulo

- CLr thulo said the issue of the burst pipe will be followed up
- Regarding metsi a Lekoa not responding to calls, the matter will be investigated
- Electricity cut offs matter will be referred to Eskom

MMC Pitso

- Clr Pitso articulated that it is in the government interests that all roads be tarred
- The council has applied for grants to do most of the roads which appear on the wish lists as submitted by councillors
- Mandela Square Channel was vandalised during electricity protests and even the contractor was chased by the forum nevertheless the project will be on progress soon
- All completed roads will be added with sidewalks
- Mmampoi from Monyaka is reconstructed and its now being extended from 1.5 metres to be 7metres wide
- The speed limit cannot be increased in Watervaal because many pedestrians cross that road, rather reduce the speed limit to 40 to avoid accidents.
- He requested the councillor to insure that garbage is removed on the play ground

MMC Mcera

- Clr Mcera said ELM is aware about criminal activities in ward 36 and there is operational programme in place

- The matter of increasing road like the one in Waterdale depends on many factors and is regulated by national Road Act.
- He said Protestors should be aware that are allowed to demonstrate their democratic rights but they should make application within 7days.It should be noted that vandalism is condemned. The government is also considering to develop a law that will ensure minimum amount is charged during protests march ,that will cover damages in case there was vandalism
- Traffic light will be installed soon at Beverly Hills

Closing Remark by the Executive Mayor

The Executive Mayor said highlighted that the progress on projects that were presented were for 2011/12 financial year .The 2012/13 projects are being implemented since July 21012. The projects will be reported on them the next financial year

She thanked everyone who acknowledged the Council's work.

Opening and Welcome

The programme director Clr Manana asked community members to open the meeting in prayer, and then CLr Tatae welcomed everybody present.

Clr Radebe introduced the Municipality Manager, DMM's and all other officials present, thereafter The Executive Mayor Greta Hlongwane introduced the Mayoral Committee members and Councillors.

Purpose of the meeting

Clr Ranake said the purpose of the meeting was to report on the 2011/12 projects, particularly what was achieved and not achieved by the Council. She highlighted that the Municipality is required by legislation to constantly engage with the community on matters of development in their area.

Presentation

The Executive Mayor Greta Hlongwane thanked everyone for attending the meeting. She clarified the community members regarding what was published about her in the Sun daily newspaper. She denied the allegation that she insulted people and explained what she exactly spoke in her own words.

The Executive Mayor presented the progress report on the implementation 2011/12 projects and feedback on issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation meetings.

Ward 11

- The road from Steelpark to Sharpville need speed Humps, it is not safe for children who cross it every day on their way to school

Ward 12

- Need more information on how to register indigents.
- People from Lesotho are considered first when applied for RDP houses
- The Council is appreciated for the good work done
- Need for police stations.
- There is an ECD being built, the question is whether it will cater people with disabilities.
- Some ELM facilities are not accessible for people with disabilities.
- Proposed that ELM should come up with a new strategy for collection of rates and taxes.

Ward 13

- EPWP said they are feeling demoralised because they don't know when is their temporary job ending.
- Proposed that ELM support students funded by Anglo American in VUT, providing internships or jobs
- Proposed that SMME's be workshopped, especially contractors.
- In the township there are incidents of family members fighting for the ownership of the house, especially when the parent dies.
- Concern was raised that MM is earning lots of millions as read in one of the national newspapers but there is no evidence of service delivery.
- Kensington houses need to be repaired
- The Metsi- a- Lekoa call centre is not functional because no one pick up the community members calls.
- Sewerage not working in Sharpeville.
- Proposed that there should be community dialogue on payments of Municipality services.
- It has been observed that there are indigents who are paying due to lack of information.
- Issuing of Municipality billing Statements to the community is a costly exercise; it will be good if the money for printing could be saved for the use of other important things.

Ward 14

- High rate of unemployment
- Foreigners continue to be provided with RDP houses despite the backlog of SA citizens who are on the waiting list
- Need for high mast lights
- RDP houses are being illegally sold
- No one is attending to the damaged house of an Elderly woman in Masebethane
- Since applied for an RDP house in 2007, when asked on progress, the response was that application forms were damaged by water
- The work of the current council is appreciated
- Need for Police Stations

Ward 22

- There is grass growing in Tshepiso Tennis Volley board courts
- Sporting codes have been reduced
- There is a high rate of youth unemployment

Responses by the MMC's

MMC – Cllr Malindi

- ELM Council is concerned that most of the people are not working as a result the indigent's increases.
- The municipality is working hard to create job opportunities, so that people may come out of indigents programme and start paying their services
- To address unemployment Duncanville Corridor initiative was approved, it consists of companies that will employ a reasonable amount of people who are not working, Enterprise hubs will also be established in Sharpville and Sebokeng
- There are other initiatives that are in place like creation of opportunities through EPWP and CWP programmes.
- The Council also continues to attract investors to Emfuleni Municipality.
- ELM has partnered with business in providing skills on business to the SMME's.
- Resolution was taken by the council that 13 properties be sold (particularly Council vandalised building, including old abandoned shops). The process will be in the form of tender where people bid.

MMC – Cllr Godoli

- In addressing the issue of illegal dumping at sea point, she requested the community members to identify a common place to be a dumping site. This will help the community even during the times when the trucks are broken and unable to collect to use it.
- Cllr Godoli appealed to community members who are renovating their houses to take rubble to legal dumping sites.
- She encouraged the ELM community to keep the environment clean.
- Issue raised about EPWP's that they are instructed to work in illegal dump sites will be investigated.

The following are comments raised by members of the public after the Mayor's presentation

Ward 19

- Request for progress regarding the library on corner Adams road
- Thusong centre not assisting the youths with computer facilities.
- What is the exact role of Evaton Renewal Programme?

Ward 20

- Small businesses are not given an opportunity and as a result, local residents suffer a lot.
- Library was built with the amount of R1, 2 Million, yet is incomplete and worst of all it was built with boards; this raises dissatisfaction to the community.
- Our Councillor is working but is being failed by the Mayoral Committee.
- Some of the proposed projects do not appear in the IDP presentation.
- Lack of services causes disappointment.

Ward 24

- Concern over bad road conditions.
- Amount of funds allocated to wards should be equal, so that other ward councillors are not compromised.
- How do children access bursaries?
- The Council should visit different wards to inspect whether Councillors are working or not.

Ward 29

- There is a need for speed humps in Boundary Road.
- Monitoring should be conducted on projects.
- Milner Road is incomplete, what we see in the presentation is not a true reflection of what is happening on the ground.
- Emuleni's strategy referred to as 'Releasing human potential', need serious engagement.

Ward 40

- Disappointment over the unavailability of the Mayor and Speaker when invited to Ward 40.
- What happened to disaster fund?
- Roads are inaccessible during rainy days.
- The so called park is used for soccer, church and other activities.

MMC – Clr Pitso

- Clr Pitso said Mochobane and Dlamini streets are part of the streets submitted in a business plans to request funding from MIG.
- ELM has no sufficient funds to address all the issues raised; it means improvements in payments of municipal services will make the difference.
- There is a program in place to unblock all stormwater channels in ELM.
- It should be noted that the new recreation and sports infrastructures are now being built in a user friendly way for the people with disabilities.
- The issue of erecting Speed humps in Andries Pretorius ,Steelpark will be investigated to see its feasibility .In the meantime parents are encouraged to ensure that their children cross the street safely on their way to schools and secondly it should be noted that there are school patrollers in place.

MMC Ranake

- Appealed to the care workers of children not to misuse children's grants.
- There is money for the extension of Tshepiso Clinic.
- Care workers, especially owners of crèche should be aware that they will be constantly visited to check if they comply with the law in the running of their centres. She appealed to them that they should attend meetings when invited; they should not be threatened by rumours that their crèches will be closed.

MMC – Clr Radebe

- Clr Radebe made the community members aware that ELM constantly interacts with Sports Council regarding sports development of their areas
- Regarding a truck in Tshepiso that is blocking the traffic, he requested the councillor to address the problem urgently.
- Clr Radebe outlined on the progress of erection of the courts next to the stadium. He explained the fencing done is part of phase one.
- He notified the community members that no alcohol will be allowed at the swimming pools, especially bottles. The facility is being used by children and swimming learning programmes takes place there.

MMC – Clr Mcera

- Clr Mcera said Crime strategy has been adopted by the Council that is a document that will be used to address crime.
- CPF has been launched.
- Mobile policing is in place including 10 cars in 5 sectors. Two officers has been provided per sector.

MMC – Clr Thulo

- The need for highmast lights is noted.
- Tshepiso South lights will be connected by Eskom in the financial year 21012/13.
- Eskom will be invited to the public meetings to come and answer some of the issues which are in areas of their competency.
- Clr Thulo appealed to the community to save water because it's a scares resource.

MMC – Clr Ronyuza

- Clr Ronyuza said, since July 2012 ELM has been sending statements on municipal services to the community which indicates the money they owe to the council. He said he believes the list also included the indigents; but they should approach the ELM offices to renew their status.

MMC – Clr Ntombela

- Clr Ntombela responded on the issue of the concerned EPWP's ,she said no one is hired without contracts.
- She clarified the issue of MM salary, that the media published wrong information that was later corrected in the same newspaper. She further explained to the community members that MM salaries is legislated, and there are several factors that are considered like job market related salary scales, qualification etc.

MMC – Clr Khubheka

- Clr Manana said , allocation of housing is in Tshepiso in extension 4, Tshekeng people will be considered next time
- She warned the illegal occupants of RDP houses that they are going to be evicted.
- People should note that it is illegal to sell RDP houses.
- In explaining what happened at Masebethane she said the council had applied for 91 subsidies but 8 qualified. The council disputed the results and re applied of which 22 qualified. The balance will soon be attended to, there is still other extension phases to be built soon.
- In regards to foreigners occupying RDP houses, she said this happen because some of community members do them favours.
- Clr Khubeka said it should be noted that there are other means the government use to address issues of housing ,for example, social housing in a form of rental stock.
- In regards to issues of eviction of orphans from their homes, she said its a legal matters, she advised that individuals contact legal aid board.
- Repairing of houses in Kingston will be done in phases.

Closing remarks by the Executive Mayor

- There is a new policy for indigents .It states that if a community member owns a house that cost R150 thousands upward, he or she should pay rates and taxes. Valuation will be done soon and if people are in that category and not working they should register as indigents
- Regarding family fights for the houses, it is not the competency of the municipality to intervene. People are encouraged to draw wills regarding their assets.
- The proposal to pay flat rate of R200 is not acceptable because that money will not be sufficient to address issues of service delivery.
- The Executive Mayor thanked everyone for coming and their cooperation during the meeting.

Opening and Welcome

The Programme Director Cllr Tshabala requested one member of the community to open the meeting in prayer. Cllr Bikitsha welcomed everyone present, followed by Cllr Thulo introducing councillors subsequently Cllr Ranake and all officials present.

Purpose of the meeting

Councillor Malindi said the purpose of the meeting was to give feedback on issues raised by community members during April/May 2012 public participation.

Presentation

In her opening remarks the Executive Mayor commented on allegations made in the Sun newspaper, that she insulted community members. In clarifying the matter she stated that she was appealing to the community members to pay municipality

services and explaining that fixed rate won't be acceptable. She said it was unfortunate that she was misquoted.

The Executive Mayor presented the progress report on the implementation of 2011/12 projects and feedback on issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation.

Ward 3

- Small streets in the townships need to be fixed too.
- Proposed that a fix rate of R200 for municipal services be paid.
- Request that people in Boipatong living in the backroom of houses be billed separately on municipal services, this will avoid disputes between Landlords and tenants.

Ward 7

- There are no timeframes reflecting on the presentation on when the projects will be completed.
- Grateful that Bophelong stadium is complete.
- The language used in the presentation is not user friendly.
- Need for speed humps.

Ward 8

- Need to know the criteria that will be used to hire people to work in a Regional Sewer Scheme Project.
- Need for old age centre.
- Ambulances turnaround time is slow and there are no doctors at the clinics, eventually one is referred to hospital.
- There are dangerous neglected opened channels

Ward 23

- The Bophelong stadium is not complete

Responses by MMC's

MMC - Cnr Khubheka

- People have to understand that when the Council refers to the project as started, they also include feasibility studies.
- The issue of including timeframe is noted.
- Title deeds are found in Bophelong offices.

MMC - Cnr Ranake

- The issue of man referred by clinic to Johan Heyns will be followed up
- ECD in Sharpeville is in progress, it will also include old age facility, it is then after its completion that Bophelong one will start
- Cnr Ranake encouraged the elderly people to form Lunch on Clubs and they should be aware that those initiatives are usually supported by Provincial Social development department.

MMC - Cnr Radebe

- Cnr Radebe said the Stadium is complete, there is gym and some nets erected

- Any dissatisfaction will be addressed and should be noted that ELM regularly engage with Bophelong Sports Council

MMC - Clr Godoli

- Clr Godoli said, due to financial constraint and trucks that sometimes breaks that dates are sometimes missed for waste collection. This does not mean the community members should create illegal dumping. She recommended that community members identify a common place where everybody can use for dumping

MMC - Clr Thulo

- Sewer Scheme Project is going to address all sewer problems encountered in Emfuleni. So far the project is in the design stage.

MMC - Clr Malindi

- ELM is working hard to reduce high unemployment rate. Currently the Duncanville Corridor has been approved which will create many jobs. In 2014 the logistic hub will be established in Old Iscor Plots. The initiative will also reduce indigents in the community.
- SMME's companies will be alternated when provided jobs by ELM, to ensure that everyone benefit. The Regional Sewer Scheme project will benefit all residence of Emfuleni.

Final Remarks by the Executive Mayor

- The Executive Mayor in her closing remark said, the projects that were not done properly will be fixed. She thanked the community for showing appreciation to the council work.
- Regarding the orphans she said, the building of the other orphanage is in the pipeline
- The issue of paying R200 flat rate on rates and taxes is not feasibly. The money won't be sufficient to develop Emfuleni
- She made an announcement on a new job initiative called CWP whereby 50 people are going to be employed in ward 6; the project is being rolled out per ward. The criteria that will be used to employ, first preference will be given to the very poor households.
- She advised that, the same people should not be employed in all projects, everyone should get a chance. Stormwater programme and sidewalks are on the pipeline, that will cater people using wheelchairs on the streets
- She finally thanked everyone for coming

Cllr Ranake said the purpose of the meeting was to report on the 2011/12 projects and achievements. She highlighted that the Municipality is required by legislation to constantly engage with the community on matters of development within its jurisdiction area.

Presentation

The Executive Mayor Cllr Greta Hlongwane thanked everyone for attending the meeting. Her opening remark was largely about her briefing to the Parliament about the municipality's state of affairs. She also made emphasis on payment of rates and taxes as well encouraging the community to keep the environment clean. The Executive Mayor presented the progress report on the implementation 2011/12 projects and feedback on issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation.

Opening and Welcome

Cllr Ngubane opened the meeting officially and welcomed everyone present. The programme director Cllr MP Gqefosha introduced the Councillors, Deputy Municipal Manager's and all other officials present.

The Executive Mayor Opening Remark

The Executive Mayor said it was that time of the year when municipality had come back to the community to account on the projects implemented. She alluded the municipality had come to provide progress report on 2013/14 budgeted projects and to receive inputs for further planning.

She applauded the community of Tshepiso for cooperating with the municipality and their patience in waiting for their electricity connection. She stated that the following Provincial street projects that were suspended will continue from where they left off by the same contractors:

- Sebe Street,
- West Road and
- Bodea Street

The Executive Mayor announced that the developers of Palm Springs mall are going to build a swimming pool and as a donation to the community. She also mentioned that that the smart meters project has geared up, and they will be installed in residential areas, including businesses like car wash.

She said the community would have noticed the presence of police, By-law officers in their wards. They are there to ensure that by-laws are not transgressed and to keep law and order.

She discouraged unlawful and violent protests and said that the community members should opt for the process of submitting petitions to the municipality. There is also a Mayoral and presidential hotlines that can be used to state any issues.

- Lind road is incomplete

- Its been two weeks since the dust bins were last collected

Ward 26

- The clinic is small
- Need public transport in Extension 7B

Ward 29

- Need an explanation why Evaton and Muller roads were not completed
- Community members have no title deeds for their houses and when enquire about it they are sent from pillar to post
- Request to be involved in the initial planning of projects taking place in the wards

Ward 38

- Community member complained that a vacant land in Zone 6 next to his house is turned into an illegal dumping

Ward 40

- The Sebe Street in Extension5 is incomplete
- There is no water in Lake Side Extension 4.
- Concerned that the housing project that had been there only built 380 houses in the past eight years. So, when will the other houses be built?

Ward 41

- Wetland not taken care of and is next to the crèche

Ward 42

- Now that renovation has stopped at the golf club, pipes are left unattended and they have become an abode for drug users

- There are no social amenities; the post office has been relocated.

Ward 43

- There is municipal space that is not maintained
- Attention should be given to road safety due to high level of accidents.
- High numbers of churches in one vicinity is a concern, who is allocating land to this mushrooming churches?

Ward 44

- Police vehicles always speeding in Chamberlain Road.
- Inconsistency over the allocation of speed humps.
- There is a need for traffic lights at Evaton Plaza
- There is a need for speed humps.
- The 'Vision, Mission and Motto' of Emfuleni should be practicalised.
- Concern is raised over work occupied by people living outside the Emfuleni municipal boundaries.

Closing remark by the Executive Mayor

- Most of the local contractors do not comply with the requirements. It has been six months since we have called the meeting to explain the issue of 30% and contractor's requirements but contractors did not avail themselves.
- The available budget cannot cater for the tarring of all streets because the township contributes only 3% for rates and taxes to the municipality.
- A special team has been set up to address the projects needs and implementation.
- By-Laws will be implemented in Emfuleni.
- The community should direct their protests to motorists who are speeding on the roads rather than to the municipality.
- The community needs to be taught about the different roles of the provincial government and the municipality.

Meeting adjourned at 17:45

Ward 44

- There is sewer spillage on the streets and Metsi a Lekoa's response time is poor.
- The system used by ELM for the allocation of houses is not fair. People are not allocated houses according to the list and year of application.
- Evaton Police Station functions inside a mobile structure and when the physical one will be built. It also serves 14 wards yet there is no parking.
- There are lots of school drop outs between the age of 14 and 17 years in the ward and that is contributed by the lack of youth development centres in Evaton.
- Provincial projects taking place in the wards need to be monitored
- No wish list projects
- Long waiting list for the RDP houses dating back to 1996

The Executive Mayor Closing Remark

- The Executive Mayor said she had raised the issue of Evaton Renewal with the MEC. It was agreed that the three contractors who were stopped to build the roads be reinstated and resume with the work.
- She informed the community members that Ward 29 don't have title deeds because their townships were not registered. The process of registering some townships is ongoing.
- The problem of waste collection will be attended. The challenge with previous trucks that were used for collection was that they were contracted and contract came to an end; now the new ones are coming.
- Metsi a Lekoa will also be allocated a Van, which will improve response time.
- Ward 44 will also be prioritised
- She encouraged community members to do gardening and parks to all unattended open spaces instead of turning them into dumping sites.
- In response to housing issue, she had recommend that ELM start to provide Social Housing and Rental Stock for the community
- The youth from Evaton should meet ELM Youth Desk Coordinator to discuss youth development
- Community members should note that when National or Provincial government implement projects, they hire anyone suitable for a job from anywhere in Emfuleni, not only from particular wards.
- The Executive Mayor said they will liaise with province to discuss some of the issues that were raised in the meeting, particularly on police stations, schools and clinics.

Opening and Welcome

Councillor Mtambo asked one member of the community to open the meeting in prayer. She then introduced the Executive Mayor, the members of mayoral Committee, Councillors, Officials and the community members of Emfuleni Local Municipality.

Purpose of the meeting

Councillor Malindi said according to Municipal System Act of 2000, the executive Mayor is expected to engage with the community on matters of development within her jurisdiction area. The purpose of the meeting is to report on the progress made in 2012/13-2014 and to receive inputs from the community for further planning.

Executive Mayor Opening Remark

The Executive Mayor announced that ELM is the only municipality that regularly account and report on the project progress made in the wards. She said she was aware on the challenge of N1 Street and water logged houses and the matter is attended.

She announced that smart meters program will be rolled out soon and members' of the community will now be able to see when they have used water over free 6klitres. Afterward the project of rolling the bins will follow. She mentioned that, she was not impressed by the way refuse bins are used by community members. Some of them are used for beer storage, hide stolen cements etc. Community members will have to look after their environment, use those bins and Municipality workers will come and collect the waste from their yards. In the case where they experience problems with collection, they should report the matter to the offices.

Members of the community should be aware that their Councillors have submitted their wards wish list to her office. The communities have to verify if the projects they have identified is on these list.

In regards to Boiketlong issue, the Executive Mayor said the matter is being petitioned. They are waiting for a petition board from the province to respond. The community should be aware that the government is also in the process of buying them a land and houses will eventually be built. Meetings will be called to further discussion regarding the matter. One of the provisional measures the Municipality had was to put water tanks at Boiketlong.

Presentation by Executive Mayor

Executive Mayor did the presentation.

- The Speaker said, though ANC is the ruling party in the government, ELM provide municipal services to all community members irrespective of their political affiliation. Councilors are expected to conduct public meetings which are not political party oriented.

The Executive Mayor Closing Remark

- The Executive Mayor said community of Boiketlong should be aware that, another community member has also submitted petition that has caused delay. However the petition committee is handling an issue.
- In zone 19 there is a case going on regarding people who put themselves in the houses and the law will take its cause. Meetings will be called by Councilors at the respective wards soon to discuss all the housing issues. The council will also engage the Province on that matter.
- When a pensioner stays with a child who is working, they should pay for municipality services particularly if there is an income of more than R2100 in the household.
- The executive Mayor said if community members receive a municipal services statement and they do not agree with the payable amounts they should approach council offices.
- There are areas which electricity is installed and managed by Eskom while others by ELM municipality.

Responses by MMC's

- **Clr Ronyuza** said there was tariff increase of 30% in areas where there are no metres. ELM resolved that water will be charged at 30kl in such areas .If such an amount of water is not used by community members, they should consult ELM offices. He further said, there is no cancellation of debt that will take place.
- **Clr Khubeka**, said that the Council is working towards achieving metro status. This will enable municipality to be responsible for the delivery of housing, but as for now it is Provincial competency. She said ELM fully acknowledge that backlog exist in housing due to inflow of new people from other provinces to the municipality.
- She mentioned that there are discussions taking place regarding the delivery of Rental Stock and also establishment of housing tribunal which will assist in resolving some of the housing issues. In regards to Back yard rooms there is limited number of them that will be rolled out and they are waiting for funds from the province. Boipatong Hostel Project is outstanding because it was rejected by youth and the budget was redirected to other areas of development.
- In regards to an instance where a person had received a subsidy dies, she said the house will be given to one of a family member.

- She informed the community that ELM, is still discussing the plan to service vacant land and allocate stands to the community.
- **MMC Radebe** said that, there are projects which are about to start in Polokong, a clinic, library and Multipurpose centre.
- The request for poles at the ground is noted.
- He mentioned that an effective Sports committee needs to be established. Currently the existing members are the ones who are neglecting existing sports facilities due to their internal squabbles. It is unacceptable that they are the ones who come and complain in the public meetings. He further, appealed to the community to take care of their community facilities
- He said the issue of Boipatong Hall was also noted.
- **MMC Pitso** said, ELM has resolved that no roads will be built without storm water.
- In regards to an issue of taxi rank, the community members should be aware that it was built by Gauteng Department of Transport and taxis associations had a conflict concerning it. Discussions are still taking place to ensure that it functions.
- He further said that Old Age and Early Childhood structures are built by province.
- Ward 9 concerned about consultation of the community would be handled by a Speaker
- **MMC Thulo** said the community member who complained that she is paying too much electricity for her crèche must consult ELM offices. The issues of water of leakage, high masts are noted and will be attended. She appealed to the community members to save water because it's a scarce resource.

- It's been almost 15 years waiting to be provided with RDP house in Sonderwater
- Boitumelo Clinic is too Small
- Need a library
- There is no Public transport
- There is no remuneration for people working in an agricultural project
- Receiving bad services from nurse at the clinics

Ward 30

- Need for tarring of Roads
- Budget allocated for electricity projects is too much, should be cut for doing other projects like job creation
- Projects should be executed by people living in that ward.
- There are lots of potholes
- Water logged streets
- Commence date for the implementation of presented projects

Ward 31

- High Mast light in zone 14 is not functional since 2004

Ward 34

- Need for a stadium

Ward 36

- Electricity cuts without warnings
- No projects budgeted for this ward
- Hazard Soil in the ward
- Unfulfilled promises of housing in New Village by the Council

Responses by MMC's

- Cllr Ranake said that the community member who received badly service at the clinic to contact her so that they can resolve the matter. In regard to the need for clinic in Boitumelo, she said that the council in conjunction with the province are looking for land where they build it.
- Cllr Pitso responded to an issue of uncompleted Missisipi Road Project, he said it was one of the flagship projects that could 'not be completed due to shortage of funds. He said the council has applied for a grant for the completion of those projects. He further enlightened the community members that the Emfuleni financial year start on the beginning of July thus when the presented projects will start. He mentioned that all tenders are advertised on papers and people are welcomed to apply.

- Cllr Malindi promised that he will organise meeting with the owners of agricultural project in order to resolve the mentioned remuneration matter. He highlighted that, everyone in Emfuleini is entitled to work in any ward of their choice if projects are taking place .He stated the council intention of attracting more investors in Emfuleni in order to combat unemployment.
- Cllr Thulo said it is difficult to respond on behalf of Eskom regarding electricity issues, although the municipality will further engage with Eskom to highlight community concerns. She encouraged community members to save water since is a scarce resource.

Closing remark by Executive Mayor

- The executive Mayor informed the community members that there is newly established Monitoring and Evaluation Unit, and she will make follow up regarding progress of the mentioned projects. She asked the councillors and community members' to come together to prioritise the projects of their wards and submit them to speaker's offices. The aim is ensure that every ward is included in the budget during planning.
- She said housing is the competence of the province; however the council will make a follow up with them. Regarding the issue of upgrading hostels, the province withdrew funding due to community member's disagreement on how the project should be implemented. She promised to contact province to reinstate the funds. The executive Mayor thanked everyone for attending the meeting.

Opening and Welcome

The Programme Director Cllr Khoali requested one member of the community to open the meeting in prayer, she then welcomed everyone present. Cllr Malindi introduced the executive Mayor, Members of Mayoral Committee and the Councillors.

Purpose of the meeting

Cllr Pitso articulated that as a government for the people by the people, it is crucial that interests be taken on the community. He said it is a legislative requirement that the community becomes involved in the municipality planning. He said that the

Executive Mayor was there to report on the implementation of 2011/12 projects and feedback on the issues that were raised during April/May 2012 public participation meetings. Cnr Pitso emphasized the importance of the relationship that the community, Council and Administration should have as legislated by MSA. Lastly he thanked the community members who have been paying for their municipal services and encouraged them to continue to do so.

Presentation by the Executive Mayor

The Executive mayor in her opening remark introduced The Acting Municipal Manager, senior management team members and other officials. She expressed her disappointment on the illegal connection of electricity at Kwa Masiza. The Mayor spoke about the provision of 6kl free water to Indigents', but they should be aware that immediately they use more than that they will pay from 7kl. She advised community members to report leaking taps in order to save water. It's a responsibility of the owner of the house to fix any sewer pipes in the yard; the council is responsible for the ones in the street.

Discussions and questions

Ward 2

- Concerned that ELM reports are questionable in terms of financial viability
- Waterval, it's a busy road, it was suggested that the speed limit be increased to avoid issuing of unnecessary traffic tickets,
- There is no progress on the development of hostels into family units
- Need High for High Mast Lights
- Early Childhood Centre is needed
- Not all school patrollers are being paid
- Parents should be encouraged to stop buying expensive phones for their children and neglecting to pay municipal services

Ward 17

- No progress regarding Western development

Ward 27

- Need to know when the construction of clinic and library start
- It's been long awaiting for RDP houses
- Suggested that By-Laws be functional (Air Pollution)
- There is Electricity cuts without prior warning
- Unpleasant Odour from Sebokeng Water Works
- Houses in Boitumelo are too small
- Bad Soil
- Bad conditions of Roads
- Proposed that locally people be hired during constructions or implementation of other projects

Ward 28

- Clinics, roads and solar geysers were promised but nothing happened

- No schools in Sonderwater, as a result number of children have to cross Golden High way to reach other schools
- Tshwaranag project had represented ELM in a competition and won a prize of R300 thousand, but project members were never acknowledged nor give them something.
- According to one of the community members, the land owner had freely donated the land to the in Boiketleng people, but it seemed like ELM does not want to develop it
- Drainage pipes erected to drain water for water logged houses and streets were not installed properly and they discharge white substance
- There are problems with sewer drainages in the yards and for Lekoa to attend to it one needs to pay R150
- Houses are built in Wet land area
- Proposed that soil be checked before houses are built

Ward 30

- In 1995 residents of Sebokeng were told that their debt of the municipality service will be cancelled, but it came as a surprise as to an old age when she received the statements that she owes R5000
- As a plumber without qualification papers would like to offer services to the community since Metsi a lekoka are not attending to people complains in time.
- Barcodes were placed in the houses to mark houses that were going to be extended with two backrooms, since awaiting the action
- Youth are employed but not paid by contractors
- There are illegal occupants in RDP houses, while some are threatened to be evicted from their shacks in the area and they are holding form C
- People have receiving accounts from Eskom, when they are queried they say that is the money they are owed by Emfuleni
- There is no account on money won at Botho ke Bontle competition
- Community members were coerced to pay R500 for the cancellation of debt owing to the municipality
- In the BOT meeting the councillor announced that R30 million rands has been set aside for the building of houses, but nothing has happened
- In zone 16 the councillor coerced the elderly people to fill the forms without explaining its purpose or providing full information
- Housing roof is wobbly and the council ever since promised to fix it

Ward 32

- Need for title Deeds

Ward 34

- Water logged houses in Tshabatsatsi zone 11
- Youth involved in crime activities, need to create job creations plan

Ward 35

- No Councillor Visibility
- The street from Monyaka in Mampoi is being reconstructed many times

Ward 36

- There is a pipe that has busted next to Moloantoea garage and has not been attended.
- During rainy seasons when one flush toilets water remains up and standstill
- Water logged Street next to Moloantoea garage
- There is no infrastructure in Boiketlong
- There is highly rate of robbery and theft
- There are preferential when coming to allocation of RDP houses in New Village, New people are approved first
- Its been long being in a housing waiting lists

Responses by MMC's

MMC Radebe

- Clr Radebe said the issue of ward 27 regarding promised library is on the pipeline. He made community members that ELM together the provincial department have done some tours in Boiketlong and Boitumelo.
- Regarding the land handed over to the community, it should be noted that everybody claimed the ownership of that land in Boitumelo. The owner should approach ELM office with his title deeds.
- The ground in ward 36 was assessed by the municipality; the place is not suitable to become a play ground. It has been illegally occupied.
- The church never requested or claimed the ground, they have illegally occupied place

MMC Khubeka

- Clr Khubeka said title deeds are issued in Houtkop
- Regarding housing issue in zone 30, she explained the process of housing application starting with Form C to application for subsidy for building a house.
- The connection of pipes is in place and people will be contacted on a progress
- The bar coding of houses was a project of 20PTP. After it was piloted in Boipatong, ELM requested the province to roll it out in other areas.
- She requested that the land claimer called Johnny to contact ELM to discuss the issue of land(in ward 36)
- The people raised the issues of being contracted must see DMM(EDP)
- Housing department in ELM is trying their level best to allocate houses to number of people in the waiting list
- The issue of pipes discharging the white substance will be attended together with province
- Community members should be aware that feasibility studies are conducted before houses are built.
- Investigation will be made on people who applied for houses from 2010 and are being allocated prior to the 2007 applications
- Bonds houses are not the responsibility of the municipality

MMC Ronyuza

- Outlined the results of Auditor general reports for ELM, which started as disclaimer now qualified. This was to dismiss misconceptions and misinterpretations of those results as read in the media.
- Revenue manager is currently making plans to conduct workshops on Masakhane
- Clr Ronyuza announced that statements were sent to the community that show the amount they owe to the municipality for services. The community members are urged to pay and those who are not working to register as indigents.

MMC Malindi

- Clr Malindi said doors are opened for the community to share their ideas regarding job creation with the council. He acknowledged the good work done by food garden project members. He said the council is aware about the issue of land and meeting with the project management will continue.

MMC Godoli

- Clr Godili said she was not aware that the trucks for waste they don't enter zone 24, therefore the matter will be followed up. She explained to the community members that the money won for Bontle ke Botho competition is used for wards projects. Business plans should be submitted first before the money can be released to the wards.

MMC Thulo

- CLr thulo said the issue of the burst pipe will be followed up
- Regarding metsi a Lekoa not responding to calls, the matter will be investigated
- Electricity cut offs matter will be referred to Eskom

MMC Pitso

- Clr Pitso articulated that it is in the government interests that all roads be tarred
- The council has applied for grants to do most of the roads which appear on the wish lists as submitted by councillors
- Mandela Square Channel was vandalised during electricity protests and even the contractor was chased by the forum nevertheless the project will be on progress soon
- All completed roads will be added with sidewalks
- Mmampoi from Monyaka is reconstructed and its now being extended from 1.5 metres to be 7metres wide
- The speed limit cannot be increased in Watervaal because many pedestrians cross that road, rather reduce the speed limit to 40 to avoid accidents.
- He requested the councillor to insure that garbage is removed on the play ground

MMC Mcera

- Clr Mcera said ELM is aware about criminal activities in ward 36 and there is operational programme in place

- The matter of increasing road like the one in Waterdale depends on many factors and is regulated by national Road Act.
- He said Protestors should be aware that are allowed to demonstrate their democratic rights but they should make application within 7days.It should be noted that vandalism is condemned. The government is also considering to develop a law that will ensure minimum amount is charged during protests march ,that will cover damages in case there was vandalism
- Traffic light will be installed soon at Beverly Hills

Closing Remark by the Executive Mayor

The Executive Mayor said highlighted that the progress on projects that were presented were for 2011/12 financial year .The 2012/13 projects are being implemented since July 21012. The projects will be reported on them the next financial year

She thanked everyone who acknowledged the Council's work.
