Of him they remember that his tribal wife was Ngwana Ithalane, i.e. she was of the Ithalane sib, and she was the mother of LESIBILO, the next chief. He also lived at Serare, and died there.

LESIBILO wife and issue

- 1 Ngwana Kamodike, da. of a member of the Kamodike clan, from which it was permissible for the chief to get a tribal wife, if there was no suitable girl in the Ithalane sib.
- LESIBILO m

LESIBILO was succeeded by his son LESIBILO, under whom they moved to Dshede (Sete), some distance west from the present head kraal. There LESIBILO was killed in a Swazi raid.

LESIBILO was succeeded by his son MAMÔRA. It was during his reign that the Khuna Chungeans came and settled in these parts at Mhikone near the dip, or Mthaxone by beyond. They passed on and settled further north, then returned and lived at LESIBILO's, and finally settled where they are now, in Mhlaya's Location.

When Mako's people came into these parts they also found MAMÔRA in office as chief.
