4 MS LE ROUX: This is the -

5 CHAIRPERSON: Has the witness got a copy?

MS LE ROUX: 6 Yes

GENERAL NAIDOO: Just receive it, thanks.

MS LE ROUX: 8 So Chair, if I can just

9 explain what has changed on this summary, and first of all

let me say that the Human Rights Commission team apologises 10

11 for the error which occurred on our side. There are three

12 changes to the analysis which we've marked in red on the

13 revised document. The first appears on page 7 of the

14 document, which relates to the statements by Constable van

15 Zyl. What happened with Constable van Zyl's statement is

we had worked with translations of the Afrikaans 16

17 statements. The originals are in Afrikaans and they were

18 translated. Unfortunately in that exercise a paragraph was

skipped in one of his statements. That has now been

20 translated an corrected and added into the summary

21 document, as you'll note in red.

22 Two pages on we have revisions to the statements

by Warrant Officer Breedt. What happened with Warrant

24 Officer Breedt is unfortunately we did not have copies of

all three of his statements. When the Major General on

Friday referred to his statement it became clear that we

2 didn't have the statement he was referring to. We've now

3 obtained that from the witness and from the SAPS legal team

and we've been able to analyse that and add it to the 5

summary.

And then finally with respect on the last page to Warrant Officer Moorcraft again we've been provided now with the second statement that we did not previously have.

9 So these have all been included.

We are also obviously in the process of rechecking every other translation that we've done. They were done through the course of last year and we're now rechecking all of those translations. We have checked all of the statements that are in the MMM41-series, K9, POP, and Mounted. They all appear to be accurate and complete.

Chair, of course what would help us to avoid such an error in the future is if we could obtain a consolidated index of all the statements that have been provided, that would assist us. I know the evidence leaders have also mentioned the need for that. We'll follow up with them in that respect.

CHAIRPERSON: An interesting question arising, which I hope not to have to decide, and that is who would be responsible for preparing such a consolidated index. But perhaps I can get suggestions as to the answer

1 to that.

2 MS LE ROUX: Chair, we're hopeful that

the SAPS legal team have such a working index that they've

been using and would be willing to share it, but we'll

5 pursue that.

> CHAIRPERSON: I must say, Adv Hemraj reminds me we didn't have the third statement either that you referred to. Anyway, these are housekeeping matters

9 that we must sort out and we must decide who will have the

10 responsibility for preparing the consolidated list of exhibits and obviously that's something we'll be able to

12 solve. But clearly, we need it. Would you like to proceed

13

now with your cross-examination, or is there some more

14 housekeeping you want to mention?

15 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MS LE ROUX (CONTD.):

16 Yes, thank you, Chair. Good morning, Major General.

> **GENERAL NAIDOO:** Morning.

18 MS LE ROUX: Major General, I just have

three issues left to canvass with you this morning. The

first of those is issues that arise from the statement

analysis that we have just been referring to, the MMM41-

series, so if I could ask you to have those three summaries

What we've looked for in here and what we've analysed, as you can see from the table, is, the first thing I'd like to start with is we've looked through the statements for confirmation of your evidence as to the events from, on the 16th from your, when you leave forward holding area 1 and end up at scene 2.

So firstly if we could start with – we've analysed for the claim that after the shooting at scene 1 the entire capacity of the members under your command, your mission as the K9 members was to escort the medics to scene 1, to the scene of the shooting. This is the issue that's summarised in the fifth column from the right-hand side, and what we see here is that two members refer to escorting medics into scene 2 when the shooting had concluded there, but no member describes their role to be to escort medics to scene 1 in their statements. Do you have any comment on that?

to why the members did not include the fact that they were escorting to scene 1, I've already indicated they were asked to provide statements about their shooting or the fact that they did not shoot. So I would assume that their priority was to indicate that they did or did not shoot.

MS LE ROUX: Major General, if we can then move on to the next issue, which is in the adjacent column, not a single K9 or POPS member in their statement refers to a diversion from the original destination of going to koppie 1 and ending up at koppie 3. Do you have any comment on why no K9 or POPS member records that diversion?

GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, I also answered this question on Friday. On the additional statement of Warrant Officer Breedt he quite clearly indicates that, in his statement that we were going in the direction and then when we heard the shooting I specifically indicated that we would go in the direction of the shooting. This additional statement was taken during the evidence tampering investigation, thus it's more in detail than the statements that were taken for the IPID shooting reports.

MS LE ROUX: Yes, but Major General, will you accept that Warrant Officer Breedt doesn't talk about a diversion, that he understood he was supposed to be going to koppie 1 and ended up at koppie 3. That's the very

GENERAL NAIDOO:

Secondly, it's not entirely true that there are members that did not indicate they were escorting the medics. On Friday I supplied a statement of one of the members of POPS, Constable Mabala, who clearly indicates in his statement that he was guarding the medics and after he got the call he brought the medics in to scene 2.

MS LE ROUX: Yes, Major General, the point of the column we're debating is escorting medics to scene 1, not scene 2. In the summary you'll see there are statements that say, that make reference to the fact that these members escorted medics in to scene 2, but nobody makes any mention of understanding that their role before you take them to koppie 3, that their role was to get medics to scene 1. That's the issue.

GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, I think one of
the things that we can see is there is an agreement that
the medics were being escorted, whether to scene 1 or scene
2, firstly. Secondly, in terms of where we were going,
I've already on Friday indicated there was a constable who
testified to that fact that we took the wrong turn and we
had to do a U-turn, which was a direct line to scene 1. As

GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, once again I will indicate at no time during any of our briefings or any of our information was there a koppie 3. The koppie 3 issue only arose when the operation was in its effect and the fact that Warrant Officer Breedt indicates that we came around the power station and that he heard shots, he says pistol and firearms, in the direction of koppie 3, then he specifically says that I was with them and I gave them an instruction that we should move towards koppie 3. Now as to why he did not refer to koppie 1 I can't, I did not facilitate the taking of the statement, but earlier in his statement he has a clear understanding that the operation was taking place at koppie 1 and he says so in paragraph 3 of his statement, that the operation was taking place in koppie 1.

MS LE ROUX: Major General, the next issue we've analysed for is that it was that the reason on your evidence, as I understand it, the reason you diverted

to koppie 3 is because as you rounded the power station and 2 before you started approaching koppie 3 you testified that 3 you heard the heavy gunfire.

4 Now again we've analysed all of the K9 and POPS 5 statements that were with you and their mention of gunfire is after they've started the approach to koppie 3. So 6 7 members talk about while they were walking in the direction of koppie 3 already they heard gunfire, but nobody mentions 8 9 it as they're coming around the power station and before they start approaching the koppie, and on our analysis the 10 11 accounts vary between that they heard the gunfire when they 12 were between 30 and 100 metres away from the koppie, so 13 they clearly were en route to the koppie already when they 14 heard the gunfire. Do you have any comment on that? 15 **GENERAL NAIDOO:** Yes Chair, two comments: 16 one we've already discussed, the issue of Warrant Officer 17 Breedt who quite clearly indicates that we heard the

18 gunshots and then I diverted them to koppie 3. 19 The second one was the issue of Constable van 20 Zyl. I think there is a, he, what he says was lost in 21 translation, if I look at the analysis, because what 22 Constable van Zyl says in his statement in paragraph 3, 23 that as we went off the tarred road alongside the power 24 station in the direction of Marikana, there were other

supported by his unit commander, Constable Motswaneng – 2 sorry, Captain Motswaneng, who in his statement quite clearly indicated that he was with the vehicles at the large power station. So that gives you a clear location of where they were when the incident occurred.

MS LE ROUX: But Major General, you can't exclude the possibility that Constable van Zyl is referring to the small power station. Obviously it's something we'll have to follow up with him.

GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, the reason why I'm not including - and obviously this information can be verified with various other members as well - the only reason why I'm indicating that the location of what he has heard would be the large power station, because the incident of his vehicle getting stuck occurred at the large power station and Captain Motswaneng was the captain, the K9 captain that remained with the vehicles and the ambulance and the constable quite clearly in his statement indicated that this captain assisted him and stayed with him at the vehicle.

CHAIRPERSON: Ms le Roux, in view of the fact that Constable van Zyl is obviously going to have to come and give evidence briefly - I hope briefly - on this topic, I don't know, think there's any point in debating what his statement means with this witness. It's

- moment there were shots heard and our convoy came around
- 2 the power station with the intention to arrest. He was the

police officials that were at the koppie and the next

- 3 driver of a motor vehicle and he goes on further to
- 4 indicate that his vehicle got stuck on a rock there and he
- 5 was assisted by Captain Motswaneng. Now this all is
- 6 clearly an indication to the large power station and an
- 7 indication of the incident at koppie 3.

MS LE ROUX: Well, Major General, this is where we differ from you. On our analysis Constable van Zyl is referring to the small power station when he says his view was obscured and that it's likely that the shooting he heard would have been scene 1 shooting, not when he was at the large power station later on, and as we track that to your evidence it was the heavy gunfire coming from what became scene 2 that prompted your approach to koppie 3.

So as we understand his chronology in that statement it would be that his view was obscured at the small power station and therefore it again doesn't support your evidence that you heard the gunfire and then moved to koppie 3.

22 **GENERAL NAIDOO:** Chair, I don't agree with that because as I said you've got to read these three 23 paragraphs within each other and the fact that his vehicle

was stuck when he went around the power station and he was

speculative; it's subject, clearly the best person to tell us what he means in his statement is the constable himself when he comes, so I suggest you -

MS LE ROUX: Yes, Chair, I am moving on.

5 CHAIRPERSON: Ja.

MS LE ROUX: Major General, what we then did, and this appears in the four columns on the left-hand side of the spreadsheet after the rank and name of the member appears, is we've set out the account that those members do give and specifically in each column we've addressed what each member understood his role to be, based on the briefing they received from you, what each member understood to be the purpose of moving towards the power station, what each member understood to be the purpose of moving towards the koppie, and when each member first records hearing any gunshots from koppie 3.

Now if we could start with MMM41.3, that's the Mounted Unit, the only member from that unit that we deal with is your driver, Lieutenant Colonel Tongwane. Now he in his statements, and when he's referring to what he understands his role to be it's that he believes that he's there to give back-up to the other groups who are already at the mountain and that they would proceed in a line formation towards the mountain where the police and protesters were heading. So again he doesn't seem to

- reflect any understanding that his role was to get you and
- 2 the medics to scene 1 and he only seems to think that he's
- 3 giving back-up to koppie 3. Do you have any comment on

4 that?

5 **GENERAL NAIDOO:** Sorry Chair, yes, as I

indicated firstly the primary purpose of the statements 6

- 7 that were taken from the various members was to ascertain
- 8 whether they fired their weapons or not. Secondly by
- 9 indicating that, he clearly indicates his duties was to,
- was, he was posted as my driver and we were going to 10
- 11 provide back-up to the other members who were at the koppie

1, at the mountain normally referred to koppie 1. 12

13 As to the specific, the detail in terms of the 14 rest of it, it does not refer specifically to all his

activities. For example I indicated that we took a wrong

turn and we had to do a U-turn. This is not contained in 16

17 the statement.

So I'm once again saying that the purpose of the statement basically was to determine whether they shot or

20 did not shoot. So there were many facts in the narrative

21 that I have already given as to the sequence of events that

22 were not captured by the individual members.

- 23 [09:32] MS LE ROUX: Major-General, several
- 24 members also referred to understanding that their role was
- 25 to arrest miners. And again they don't refer to any

- concern getting medics to scene 1 or anything like that.
- 2 You've obviously seen in the statement where, for example,
- 3 Warrant Officer Breed as well as members Koswane, van Zyl,
- 4 Mabogwana from POP, Baloyi from POP and Mentesh. There
- 5 seem to be some confusion in the members. In fact the
- 6 statements of your K9 member, Mentesh he even says in his
- 7 statement he didn't know what was happening. Do you have
- 8 any comment on this apparent confusion that we do see in
- 9 the statements, when members are describing what they're
- doing? Some of them think they are engaged in arresting, 10
- 11 some are only there in a third line to back up the other
- 12 units. Some seem to think they must only be using their K9
- 13 dogs to after the operation find firearms and weapons. Do
- you have any comment on the briefing that you provided them 14
- 15 when we guite clearly see this confusion in the statements
- as to what their role was? 16

17 **GENERAL NAIDOO:** Chair, yes I think the

priority of statements, I'm not going to back to, but 18 of

these members specifically indicate in their statements

that they were briefed by me at forward holding area 1 as I

21 testified. Of those 18, of that there's 19 members who

- 22 specifically indicate the primary purpose for deployment.
- 23 They are indicating that they were there as is indicated as
- 24 a third line of defence, to sweep the koppies and the
- 25 bushes, to go in after the NIU and the TRT have finished ARCHIVE FOR JUSTICE

- sweeping the place. And to identify and arrest suspects.
- So they were clear in terms of what their primary reason
- for being there was. The issue of escorting of the medics
- was not their primary reason for deployment there, it was
- 5 my primary responsibility to ensure that the medics were
- 6 deployed where and when it was required. So I'm not
- 7 surprised that they did not mention in their statements.
- 8 But it is clear on some of the other statements that
- 9 everybody knew that the medics were with us. They were
- 10 part of the convoy and it was mentioned in some of the

11 statements.

12 MS LE ROUX: But, Major-General, I'm 13 confused by that evidence because if you're the only one at

14 forwarding holding area 1 who knows that your primary focus

is to escort medics in the event that they are required and

when the shooting happens at scene 1 that they are required

17 to be escorted to scene 1, yet the briefing that you

provide to everybody else doesn't mention that. Do you now

19 agree that that could cause some confusion and

20 misunderstanding about what the role of the members in your

21 convoy would be?

22 GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, I don't see any

23 confusion. As I indicated, on the first two days, the

24 Tuesday and Wednesday the medics were in our vehicle. They

were not with their own vehicles. On Thursday a different

- of medics came and they came with their own vehicles. We,
- in addition to that, on the Tuesday, also provided escorts
- 3 other services which were not at forward holding area 1. I
- 4 gave an example of the pathology services. When the need
- 5 came I tasked a particular vehicle to conduct the escort.
- 6 So the presence of the emergency services with us was a
- 7 clear indication that these people were working with us and
- 8 there was also an indication when we deployed the other
- 9 services how we would operate. In terms of the briefing of
- 10 the various units, their briefing was specific to their
- primary tasks and obviously as we proceeded they would be 11
- 12 informed in terms of what changes there would be, based on

13 the situation that was unfolding. But, yes there could be

14 no doubt that the medics and the fire people were in our

15 convoy for purposes of protection and security.

16 MS LE ROUX: Major-General, I'd now like 17 to take you to some of the actual statements and ask you

18 about certain aspects that we see there of their conduct as 19 the scene. Can we start with Sergeant Molangoanyane? This

is marked as MMM39.18. There are two statements, A and B.

- 21 If we can start with MMM391.18A, not that's 18B, if we
- 22 could start with 18A. Yes that's the correct statement,
- 23 thank you. So this is MMM39.18A, the first statement by
- 24 Sergeant Molangoanyane. If we could just have a look at
 - the first six paragraphs. So he states that "On the 16th of

- August I was officially on operation in Marikana Mine,
- 2 there miners on the hill, allegedly on illegal strike. We
- 3 were posted at forward holding area, we K9s. We received
- 4 instructions from General Naidoo that POP, NIU and TRT will
- 5 get those miners off the hill then we K9s will then get on
- 6 the hill to search for guns and dangerous weapons with dogs
- 7 [explosives]. We drove from forward holding area to the
- southern side of the hill. General Naidoo gave instruction 8
- 9 again to get off the vehicles with dogs on leash. K9
- 10 members with their explosive dogs made extended line
- approaching the hill. I drove with our K9 bakkie behind 11
- 12 members with dogs for cover purpose if anything can happen.
- 13 As we close, plus, minus 60 to 70 metres from a hill I
- 14 heard a shot. Immediately I got out of the bakkie. I lied
- to the ground. The second shot was fired, that's where I
- picked the direction where the shots were from. It was 16
- from green bush, right in front of me, between rocks or 17
- 18 caves. It was pistol, sounded low calibre. I crawled
- 19 forward, alerted my colleagues on my right that the green
- 20 bush that's where shots are fired from. I took out my
- 21 pistol, shooting in that bush, eight shots. I realised I
- 22 cannot reach the suspect. I decided to crawl back to the
- 23 bakkie where I found TRT and K9 members, took cover with
- 24 the bakkie. I showed TRT members that green bush, he fired
- 25 two shots with his R5 rifle. I then saw a movement, I was
 - Page 24186
- because they were in the shade. I ran into that direction, 2
- 3 that's where came a man with panga, with blanket around his
 - chest from a cave or hole in fighting stand."

- 5 And then if we can look at MMM39.18B which is the
- 6 additional statement of Sergeant Molangoanyane. If we go
- 7 from the first four paragraphs of this he states that "We
- 8 K9 unit approached from southern side, I drove K9 bakkie.
- 9 In front of me there were K9 members with their dogs on
- 10 leash in the extended line approaching a hill. Plus, minus
- 60 to 70 metres from a hill I heard a shot, I got out of 11
- 12 the bakkie for cover, a shot came again [pistol], now I
- 13 realised where it came from, a green bush. I leopard-
- 14 crawled in order to position my firing pistol 9mm into that
- 15 bush. Because K9 members now took firing positions I
- 16
- 17
- 18 that bush, but I realised I could not get the suspect
- 19 because he was out of reach. I crawled back to the bakkie
- where I found TRT and K9 members taking cover at the back
- 21 of the bakkie. I then told TRT guys to use their R5 rifles
- 22 to that bush. After two shots in that bush we went towards
- the hill." Now Major-General in circumstances where a
- 24 large crowd of people were hiding in bushes and rocks at
- 25 koppie 3 Human Rights Commission will submit that these
- - 22 23
- could have been at any one.

 - 24 was either near the vehicle in the centre of the picture or

- not sure whether that person was falling or running away

- cautioned Constable Kwele that the bush in front of me was
- problematic, I shot several [8 shots] in the direction of

- 10 specific target and the shottist should aim at a specific
- 11 target. I've already testified to that as well.
 - MS LE ROUX: And, Major-General you accept that the green bush is not a sufficiently
- 14 identified or risk.

- GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, as to whether he
- only saw a bush or he saw an outline of a person, you know,
- 17 etcetera I can't in any way testify to that, what led to
- his decision to fire at a particular place. What he
- 19 indicates he could see that the shots were coming from a particular place, so what exactly he saw I can't testify to
- 20 21 that fact.
- 22 MS LE ROUX: Major-General, using exhibit
- 23 MMM2 can you identify where Sergeant Molangoanyane was
- 24 positioned at scene 2?
 - GENERAL NAIDOO: Chair, I think maybe
 - Page 24188
 - exhibit L would be more appropriate because I L249 gives us
- the indication of the different units. Chair, from the
- 3 description of the sergeant in his statement I would
- probably put it at the vehicle which indicates forward
- holding area 2, to the right. There's an arrow from
- 6 forward holding area 2 and there's another arrow from
- 7 forwarding holding area 1 K9 which points to a particular
- 8 vehicle because there were no TRT members at forward
- 9 holding area 1 at that stage.
 - CHAIRPERSON: In fact two vehicles to
- 11 which two arrows point, but I take it you're referring to 12 the one on the extreme right-hand side. Is that correct?
- 13 Extreme left. **GENERAL NAIDOO:** 14 CHAIRPERSON: Look there are two vehicles
- 15 to which arrows point from the block which is headed FHA2
- and the block which is headed FHA1. One of them is more or
- 17 less to the right-hand side of the picture, the other one 18 is more or less in the centre. Which of the two are you
- 19 referring to? 20 **GENERAL NAIDOO:** Chair, it could have been at any one. If the TRT members were at both then it
 - CHAIRPERSON: I see, so you're saying he
 - the one on the right-hand side? You can't be more specific
