 3 Captain, you're still under oath. Ms Baloyi?
 4 WAYNE PETER KIDD: (s.u.o.)
 5 EXAMINATION BY MS BALOYI (CONTD.): Thank
 6 you, Chair. Captain Kidd, if you would go back to that
 7 statement, your consolidated statement UUU2, when we
 8 finished yesterday we were concluding paragraph 9 of that
 9 statement and you were asked questions by the Chair about
 10 your failure to call, when you moved from forward holding
 11 area 2 your failure to call Brigadier Calitz and inform him
 12 that you had moved your position and that you were now –
 13 you remember that evidence?
 14 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, I do, Mr Chairman.
 15 MS BALOYI: Okay. Do you wish to add
 16 anything to your answer that you gave to the Chairperson in
 17 that regard?
 18 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, Mr Chairman. I just
 19 wanted to say that I didn't have the numbers of the JOC or
 20 Brigadier Calitz because at that stage when we went to
 21 forward holding area 2 I was just a group commander, I
 22 wasn't in charge of the whole forward holding area 2, that
 23 was the task or role of Lieutenant-Colonel Pitsi.
 24 CHAIRPERSON: When you left to go to the
 25 other duties for which he was called, did you not ask him,

1 I'm now taking over, you had better give me those telephone
 2 numbers?
 3 CAPTAIN KIDD: Mr Chairman, you know, I –
 4 at that time we actually thought maybe he would return. So
 5 ja, it didn't come to my thoughts to take the numbers from
 6 him then.
 7 MS BALOYI: Now if you would then proceed
 8 to deal with paragraph 10 of your statement, you state
 9 there that once you "reached the koppie now known as koppie
 10 3 which is a rocky and bushy area, we took up positions."
 11 Do you see that?
 12 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, I do see that, Mr
 13 Chairman.
 14 MS BALOYI: Now if we could have, video
 15 operator, if we could have exhibit L235, slide 235? Now
 16 you have on that slide, you have two, two markings in blue,
 17 you see that?
 18 CAPTAIN KIDD: I do.
 19 MS BALOYI: One on the western side and
 20 the other on the southern.
 21 CAPTAIN KIDD: I do see that.
 22 MS BALOYI: Okay and the note at the
 23 bottom of that slide says, "The photos show the police
 24 members from forward holding area 2 converging on koppie 3
 25 from two directions, north-west and south-west." Do you

 2 CAPTAIN KIDD: I do see that.
 3 MS BALOYI: You confirm that those are
 4 your members in those blue markings there.
 5 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, those were
 6 my members.
 7 MS BALOYI: Yes. Now, in your testimony
 8 you said that when you moved from forward holding area 2
 9 you moved in a long straight line. You remember you were
 10 in a long straight line, you remember that?
 11 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, the basic line, the
 12 long, straight basic line.
 13 MS BALOYI: Yes and in your manuscript
 14 statement you estimate the length of that line to be 150
 15 metres, you remember that?
 16 CAPTAIN KIDD: I do remember that.
 17 MS BALOYI: Now this depiction that we
 18 see here, that is not a straight line. How did you end up,
 19 you and your members, how do you end up in that formation?
 20 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, this was after we
 21 were gestured by the person out of the helicopter and also
 22 on the information by Colonel Vermaak where he said the
 23 people on the left, people on the western side move to your
 24 left. This, with those instructions, that caused this.
 25 MS BALOYI: Yes and does this, these two

1 markings, do they depict the complete numbers of your
 2 members? Is everyone accounted for there?
 3 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, there are still people
 4 that are further left.
 5 MS BALOYI: Okay.
 6 CAPTAIN KIDD: If I say further left I
 7 mean more to the northern side of where that circle is.
 8 MS BALOYI: Can you just point out with
 9 your pointer please, where you're pointing?
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: Mr Chairman, it's more to
 11 where the arrow is showing, the north arrow is showing,
 12 they're more to that side.
 13 MS BALOYI: Yes.
 14 CHAIRPERSON: It's not visible on the
 15 screen, they're at the top right hand where they are –
 16 you're pointing to a spot on the top right-hand side of the
 17 picture but off the picture.
 18 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 19 Chairman.
 20 CHAIRPERSON: More or less in line with
 21 the blue circle, blue, not a circle really, but the blue –
 22 what would you call that? It's not exactly a circle but
 23 anyway. An oval really, yes, blue oval.
 24 MS BALOYI: One is oval.
 25 CHAIRPERSON: More or less in line with

Was anybody in charge of them?</p> <p>12 CAPTAIN KIDD: Mr Chairman, each –</p> <p>13 because we were different, different units and different,</p> <p>14 like in the TRT there were different people from, they were</p> <p>15 from Gauteng but it was Pretoria TRT, Joburg TRT, Honeydew</p> <p>16 TRT. | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 29021</p> <p>1 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, Mr Chairman, there was</p> <p>2 –</p> <p>3 CHAIRPERSON: A rather strange way of</p> <p>4 going about things.</p> <p>5 CAPTAIN KIDD: You know we were shown on</p> <p>6 a photograph of the different area and koppie 1 was a</p> <p>7 koppie, the other two weren't really koppies, they were</p> <p>8 just like bushy areas with a couple of rocks. They're not</p> <p>9 like a, like you would say a koppie. So you couldn't</p> <p>10 really see the difference in the height or how big the</p> <p>11 different koppies were.</p> <p>12 MS BALOYI: You then say "I instructed</p> <p>13 the members to take cover behind the rocks and bushes as I</p> <p>14 heard gunfire and the sound of bullets flying over our</p> <p>15 heads from the direction of the koppie in front of us." Do</p> <p>16 you see that?</p> <p>17 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, I do. It's written</p> <p>18 in the statement.</p> <p>19 MS BALOYI: Now when you tell your</p> <p>20 members to take cover as you describe, where are you at</p> <p>21 that point? Where are the members and where are you?</p> <p>22 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, I'm in the – like I</p> <p>23 said earlier, I was in that, this, I was part of this</p> <p>24 middle group. That was the main part, that was the main –</p> <p>25 not the main, I would say where the majority of the members</p> | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 29023</p> <p>1 there, there was probably no-one in charge.</p> <p>2 CHAIRPERSON: You were in charge of the</p> <p>3 whole line but there was, the group had divided up actually</p> <p>4 into three but we'll ignore the one that's not on the</p> <p>5 photograph. The other group was in charge of someone, you</p> <p>6 didn't know who he was so you didn't know how to contact</p> <p>7 him -</p> <p>8 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's –</p> <p>9 CHAIRPERSON: - were nominally in charge</p> <p>10 of the whole lot but practically you could exercise no</p> <p>11 control over the people in the second oval.</p> <p>12 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr</p> <p>13 Chairman.</p> <p>14 CHAIRPERSON: And you didn't even know</p> <p>15 who was your sort of, the person practically or factually</p> <p>16 in charge of those people, if there was anybody. You're</p> <p>17 not even sure there was anybody.</p> <p>18 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, I'm not even sure</p> <p>19 there was.</p> <p>20 CHAIRPERSON: So it does sound like a</p> <p>21 recipe for disaster, doesn't it?</p> <p>22 CAPTAIN KIDD: Mr Chairman, this all</p> <p>23 happened because of the helicopter gesturing for the people</p> <p>24 to split up and also with Colonel Vermaak informing the</p> <p>25 people, move, and that's why everything split –</p> |

 2 When you split up you were in charge and you knew that one
 3 group was going in another direction. Surely you should
 4 have said, right, you will be in charge of this section and
 5 we must stay in contact with each other by cell phone, if
 6 necessary. You could have done that, couldn't you?
 7 CAPTAIN KIDD: Mr Chairman, like I said –
 8 CHAIRPERSON: You could have done it,
 9 couldn't you?
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: I could have done it, Mr
 11 Chairman.
 12 CHAIRPERSON: You wanted to say, add
 13 something?
 14 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, that you know in the
 15 beginning when I explained to the people what was our aim
 16 and what we had to do, I told the group commanders. They
 17 still had to inform their people what to do and try keep
 18 control also.
 19 MS BALOYI: Now Captain Kidd, did you
 20 make the decision – in fact before you deal with that if we
 21 could have slide 249 perhaps to complete this explanation.
 22 Indeed, thank you Chair, L249. Now Captain Kidd, you see
 23 on this e-mail here you have, you have to, what we have
 24 described I think as the southern side at the bottom –
 25 rather let me start this way. At the bottom you've got a

1 purple box which has in it "forward holding area 2, TRT and
 2 POP," do you see that?
 3 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes.
 4 CHAIRPERSON: And K9 as well underneath.
 5 MS BALOYI: Yes.
 6 CHAIRPERSON: And K9.
 7 CAPTAIN KIDD: Ja, it's written K9 but
 8 not in the box.
 9 CHAIRPERSON: Yes, I know –
 10 MS BALOYI: Oh yes.
 11 CHAIRPERSON: - I understand that but the
 12 group of people there who were from forward holding area 2
 13 were made up of TRT people, POP people and K9 people.
 14 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr Chair.
 15 CHAIRPERSON: The same applies to the box
 16 which is on the left-hand side just above the middle point
 17 on the left side of the photograph.
 18 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr Chair.
 19 MS BALOYI: Yes and you see in that box
 20 that there are these, all these purple areas that are going
 21 to the south and one to the northern side. Are those all
 22 members that were in your line that you started out with?
 23 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 24 Chairman.
 25 MS BALOYI: Yes. Now, when you say that

1 when you heard gunfire, bullets over your head, you
 2 instructed members to take cover. Which members are you
 3 directing at this point?
 4 CAPTAIN KIDD: The members I was
 5 directing would be at this, if you look on the bottom right
 6 if you're looking at it, that's – it was on the right-hand
 7 side.
 8 MS BALOYI: But when you say on the
 9 right-hand side you mean in that block there at the bottom?
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct.
 11 MS BALOYI: Yes, so that is to the left
 12 of the picture.
 13 CAPTAIN KIDD: Ja. If you're looking at
 14 the screen it's to the left of the picture, ja.
 15 MS BALOYI: Yes.
 16 CHAIRPERSON: I'm sorry, I don't
 17 understand that unless I misunderstood the previous slide
 18 we saw, you know, those two ovals. Now, the one on the
 19 left-hand side of the previous slide I understood was the
 20 area, was the group of people who were not under your
 21 practical command at that stage and you indicated the other
 22 oval, the one on the right of that slide which was more or
 23 less near the north was the one that you were in charge of.
 24 Now it looks to me and I'm putting it to you not because I
 25 want to fight with you but I want you to help me to

1 understand, it looks to me as if the bottom left-hand
 2 corner, FHA2 BOC*09:07/13-06 is the oval that was on the
 3 left-hand side of the slide we saw before or have I got it
 4 wrong?
 5 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, you've got it half
 6 right, Mr Chairman. Those people that were there basically
 7 formed – if we can go back to that slide it will be easier
 8 to explain but those people, like if you look now, those
 9 people that are there, once we heard shots fired they had
 10 to go take cover. There was not enough space here so a lot
 11 of them ran, a lot of them ran to where the word "western"
 12 is, just above, there's rocks there and a lot of them ran
 13 here to come and take cover. These people on this side
 14 were those that are –
 15 CHAIRPERSON: Sorry, you've got to put
 16 that on record.
 17 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, so when –
 18 CHAIRPERSON: The ones near the western
 19 side, we have to understand that –
 20 CAPTAIN KIDD: All the people on the
 21 western side were the ones that ran –
 22 CHAIRPERSON: - that ran to the rocky
 23 area –
 24 CAPTAIN KIDD: Where it says "western"
 25 just above that.

1 CHAIRPERSON: - which is – let's do it
 2 slowly. The first group you say took cover near the words
 3 "western" on the side.
 4 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct.
 5 CHAIRPERSON: The second group took cover
 6 further to the left on that side where –
 7 CAPTAIN KIDD: Where it's pointed up –
 8 CHAIRPERSON: There's a rocky area – ja,
 9 no, but that doesn't mean anything on the transcript –
 10 there's a rocky area right near the top of that yellow line
 11 that runs from the bottom right-hand corner in a, slightly
 12 to the left, angling slightly to the left.
 13 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr Chair.
 14 CHAIRPERSON: That rocky area is where
 15 some of the other people took -
 16 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct.
 17 CHAIRPERSON: Is that right?
 18 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct. And then
 19 those people on the top, on the far top left-hand side –
 20 CHAIRPERSON: That's the oval on the top
 21 left-hand corner, yes?
 22 CAPTAIN KIDD: The oval on the top left-
 23 hand side, these were the people that if you see now were
 24 the ones that went down to the southern side. So if we can
 25 go back to the other side then it sort of – okay, so those

1 that were at the top left-hand oval, they were the ones
 2 that went here to the southern side.
 3 CHAIRPERSON: Now the people in the line,
 4 on the blue lines, those arrows, of course those weren't
 5 your people. Those were the I who came there under the
 6 command of General Naidoo.
 7 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 8 Chairman.
 9 MS BALOYI: Captain, in this line, this
 10 long line that you were in charge of, the line of members,
 11 did you or did you not have section commanders in that
 12 line?
 13 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes. Each of the units
 14 that were there had their own commander. Like the POP that
 15 came from, for example, Bethlehem, had a commander. The
 16 one from Joburg had their commander, TRTs, different ones
 17 had their own commanders.
 18 MS BALOYI: Yes. Now you talk about
 19 firing or shooting that came from the direction of the
 20 koppie and then you say it sounded like small calibre
 21 firearms. Do you see that?
 22 CAPTAIN KIDD: I do see that.
 23 MS BALOYI: And then you go on to say,
 24 "While we took cover I witnessed strikers running around
 25 inside the koppie in a group made up of approximately 100

1 strikers." Please explain, explain your observation of the
 2 strikers.
 3 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, while I told the
 4 members to take cover I was standing in a situation, in a
 5 place where I could see nicely onto the open area of the
 6 koppie.
 7 MS BALOYI: Can you just point out when
 8 you say, where you were standing and what you describe as
 9 the open area of the koppie?
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: If we go back to the
 11 previous slide –
 12 MS BALOYI: L235.
 13 CHAIRPERSON: The slide he wants is 235.
 14 MS BALOYI: Yes.
 15 CHAIRPERSON: That's now on the screen.
 16 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, Mr Chairman, I was
 17 standing – when everyone had taken cover and I was looking
 18 onto the koppie area I was standing round about to the
 19 left-hand side of the oval on the western side, the purple
 20 oval.
 21 MS BALOYI: Okay and –
 22 CHAIRPERSON: Can we translate that place
 23 into a spot on the next slide, the one we were looking at?
 24 CAPTAIN KIDD: It'll be –
 25 MS BALOYI: The dam?

1 CAPTAIN KIDD: - where the, you'll see
 2 there's like a dry dam wall and I was standing just on the
 3 edge about where the – about where the, you could say the
 4 first or the third arrow is, the shortest of the arrows.
 5 CHAIRPERSON: The purple rectangular,
 6 rectangle which is just above the mid-point of the left-
 7 hand side of the photograph, that rectangle, that has three
 8 arrows coming from it and you say you were near the head of
 9 the arrow at the extreme left of the three arrows that we
 10 see coming from that rectangle.
 11 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 12 Chairman.
 13 CHAIRPERSON: And you indicate that if
 14 one looks carefully at the spot below the head of that
 15 arrow, one sees a dry dam wall.
 16 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 17 Chairman.
 18 MS BALOYI: And the strikers that you
 19 see, that you describe, where are they?
 20 CAPTAIN KIDD: If you look, if you go
 21 straight towards the koppie areas you'll see there's a
 22 Nyala situated there. They were just in front of that.
 23 Obviously the Nyala wasn't there but it's the area just
 24 next to where the bushes or this area here, here –
 25 CHAIRPERSON: To describe that perhaps

1 one could put it this way. Near the top of the photograph
 2 is certainly a black line rectangle which has POP in it and
 3 there's a vertical arrow pointing down from that rectangle
 4 and just below the head of that arrow one can see on this
 5 photograph three vehicles, three Nyalas and if one looks at
 6 the left – of those three, one looks at the left one, the
 7 one at the extreme left – just below that there are some
 8 bushes. That seems to be the point you're showing, is that
 9 correct?
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 11 Chairman.
 12 MS BALOYI: And if you're able to
 13 estimate what do you estimate the distance between where
 14 you are and where you see the strikers that you've just
 15 described?
 16 [09:27] CAPTAIN KIDD: I would estimate it to be
 17 between 25 and 35 metres away.
 18 MS BALOYI: And what do you see, what is
 19 happening? What do you see the strikers do?
 20 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, the strikers that I
 21 saw were first of all running around. Then they gathered
 22 in a group. They were, I don't know, they were like making
 23 a sound, a sound like a – I mentioned in my statement, a
 24 hissing sound, that's how I could explain it, and they were
 25 banging their weapons against each other. So whoever had

1 two were, they were like clapping it against each other.
 2 MS BALOYI: And as you're making this
 3 observation, as you're looking at this, what is happening
 4 with the shooting that you said you were experiencing from
 5 the koppie?
 6 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, that was just, that
 7 was before that, before I told the people to take cover,
 8 that was when we were still, we still, we'd just arrived at
 9 the koppie and that's when the, we heard the shooting, or I
 10 could hear it clearly coming over our heads.
 11 MS BALOYI: And then you say, "The
 12 strikers who were in front walked in a crouching formation
 13 and pointed" – no, let me go back. You say, "The group of
 14 strikers made a hissing sound, approached the members on
 15 the western side and stopped near the bushes." Will you
 16 please indicate that?
 17 CAPTAIN KIDD: The bushes that I'm
 18 pointing at is there where the Nyala is, where the front of
 19 that Nyala is, it's those bushes over there.
 20 MS BALOYI: And the members that you say
 21 they were approaching, where are those members?
 22 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: No, Ms Baloyi, I
 23 think you must place on record the point he's pointing out
 24 on the slide –
 25 MS BALOYI: Yes, thank you –

1 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: - for the record.
 2 MS BALOYI: Thank you, Commissioner.
 3 Captain Kidd, won't you just describe the place that you've
 4 pointed out in relation to the Nyala and where your members
 5 are?
 6 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, all this area here
 7 is more like a, is an open area. There's no bushes and
 8 rocks. If you're just here where the Nyala is, to the
 9 right-hand side of the Nyala there's where the bushes
 10 start, there's, this group that I was mentioning, they
 11 gathered here.
 12 CHAIRPERSON: What you call the right-
 13 hand side of the Nyala, that's the Nyala on the extreme
 14 left of the photographs?
 15 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct.
 16 CHAIRPERSON: What you call the right-
 17 hand side of the Nyala actually is the left-hand side of
 18 the photograph because of course the Nyala is facing is and
 19 on, to the left of that Nyala there is what appears to be
 20 an open area, relatively open area, and just below the
 21 Nyala on the photograph there is this bushy area to which
 22 you're referring. Is that correct?
 23 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct, Mr
 24 Chairman.
 25 MS BALOYI: Thank you, Commissioner. And

1 the members that you say this group of strikers approached,
 2 where are those members lying?
 3 CAPTAIN KIDD: There's a little bit of a
 4 rocky place in the middle of that dry dam. If you look
 5 where one of those arrows from the purple square at the
 6 bottom left-hand side –
 7 MS BALOYI: Yes?
 8 CAPTAIN KIDD: - you'll see one of the
 9 arrows points up. There –
 10 MS BALOYI: That is the arrow on the
 11 extreme left –
 12 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's the arrow on the
 13 extreme left.
 14 MS BALOYI: Yes? So the members that you

 21 happening, what are the members doing?
 22 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, the members at that
 23 time, all these members that I pointed out there, as well
 24 as the members that are round about just below where that
 25 rocky area is, just below where the second arrow comes up

 2 members there. All these members are shouting to the
 3 strikers to, telling them put down the weapons. Okay, they
 4 are busy screaming and shouting at the strikers to put down

 8 to that?

9 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, all they, all the
 10 strikers are doing is they are – if I can remember, I can

 13 were like chanting or singing something, but they would tap
 14 it together twice and point it towards the policemen.

15 MS BALOYI: And you say there "The
 16 strikers who were in front walked in a crouching formation
 17 and pointed their weapons at the police in an aggressive
 18 manner." Is that what you're describing?

19 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's what I'm describing
 20 now. They would tap it twice against each other, point it
 21 towards the policemen, tap it twice and point it towards
 22 the policemen.

23 MS BALOYI: And then in paragraph 11, if
 24 we could go back to UUU2, and then you describe there that
 25 "All of a sudden two of the strikers from the group charged

 2 side. The two strikers made noise and shouted something
 3 that I did not understand because of the barrier language.
 4 They still charged at the police, who shouted at them to

 23 were, had taken cover and were lying –
 24 CAPTAIN KIDD: And that's where the –
 25 CHAIRPERSON: And the strikers rushed at

17 accord with your observation of your, your observation of
18 Mr Mpumza?

19 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, it doesn't. The
20 person that I saw which we referred to in the beginning as
21 Rasta but was later as Mr Mpumza didn't run this path.

22 MS BALOYI: Yes, can you just indicate
23 again, just so that there's no doubt on this slide where
24 you, how you observed him?

25 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay on this slide, Mr

11 below the knees, and the explanation that you say you got

12 from an African member, what else happened? Did anything

13 else happen in respect of those ropes and the piece of

14 cloth that you want to explain?

15 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, Ma'am, someone wanted

16 to touch it, so, and then the people said no, no, no, leave

17 it, and then I was curious to ask what it was and that's

18 when I was told by one of the African members it's some

19 form of muti used by sangomas.

20 MS BALOYI: Yes. Now if we could then go

21 back to slide 237, to try and finish off, now you've

22 explained where you were when the two strikers, the man in

23 the red jacket and Mr Mkhonjwa were shot, and you certainly

24 were not in the two white circles where you've got the two

25 arrows protruding from. You were not part of that?

1 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, I was not.

2 MS BALOYI: You were not part of that.

3 Now if you had been in one of those circles and the

4 strikers that you see there confronted you in the way that

5 you've just described, what would you have done?

6 CAPTAIN KIDD: I would also have used my

7 firearm and shot.

8 MS BALOYI: Why?

9 CAPTAIN KIDD: Otherwise I would have

10 been attacked.

11 MS BALOYI: Yes, and then Mr Mpumza that

12 you described - we don't need to go to the slide - the

13 manner in which you described the attack to the members, if

14 you had been one of those members at that confrontation

15 with Mr Mpumza, what would you have done?

16 CAPTAIN KIDD: I would have used my

17 firearm as well, especially in that situation because that

18 was very dangerous.

19 MS BALOYI: Yes, and in your opinion if

20 the members had not shot when they did, what would have

21 happened?

22 CAPTAIN KIDD: They would have been

23 attacked.

24 MS BALOYI: And finally, Captain, we know

25 that following the events with this operation in Marikana

Page 29070

1 there was a police session in Roots somewhere towards the

2 end of August into September. Did you attend and did you

3 participate in that session?

4 CAPTAIN KIDD: I did attend and

5 participate.

6 MS BALOYI: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Sorry, can you just

8 help me understand something, Captain. Initially when the

9 group under your command left forward holding area 2, how

10 did it come about that they went into different directions?

11 CAPTAIN KIDD: Mr Chairman, that came

12 about when we were gestured by the lady in the helicopter

13 and also the comments made by Colonel Vermaak where "The

14 people on the west, move to your left, move to your left,"

15 and at that time it wasn't only me that had a hand radio.

16 The hand radios, we had about 12 hand radios in our whole

17 line, so everyone was listening to those radios. So when

18 they, these comments, or instructions came over the radio,

19 the members just went and started splitting up.

20 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Were there section

21 leaders among, in that line?

22 CAPTAIN KIDD: Yes, there was.

23 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Do you know if they

24 gave any commands to move out?

25 CAPTAIN KIDD: I don't know if they gave

Page 29071

1 commands, but I'm sure they also instructed their members

2 when they heard over the radio, because if they could see

3 that I was distracted or doing something else they would

4 give an instruction to their own members.

5 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Thank you, Captain.

6 CAPTAIN KIDD: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON: Ms Baloyi?

8 MS BALOYI: Chairperson, that's the

9 evidence of Captain Kidd.

10 CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. Now I

11 understand that it was left to the parties to decide among

12 themselves who would cross-examine first. So who is going

13 to cross-examine first?

14 MS LE ROUX: Yes, Chair, I'll cross-

15 examine for the Human Rights Commission, but I believe Mr

16 Mpofo wishes to say something first.

17 CHAIRPERSON: Yes, well let's hear what

18 Mr Mpofo has to say.

19 MR MPOFU: Thank you, Chairperson. I

20 just wanted to place on record some of the issues that

21 affect a matter that we discussed a week or so ago, namely

22 around the issue, particularly the issue of the deadline of

23 31st July. We have now received instructions, Chairperson,

24 to litigate around that matter, but the issue of the date,

25 you know, particularly on the basis that we see it as, or

1 at least our clients see the danger of the proceedings not
2 being able to seek the truth and equitable treatment of the
3 parties. I won't get into details because we've already
4 raised those issues before.

5 Secondly, that the nature of the contemplated
6 proceedings would be review proceedings, Chairperson, on
7 the basis that the decision of the President to impose the
8 deadline was, among other things irrational, was done
9 without applying the mind, motivated by ulterior improper
10 motives, and are unconstitutional.

11 The situation is that, Chairperson, because a
12 positive development in that light is the fact that
13 yesterday we received an indication that there's been an
14 approach for an extension of the date by the Commission
15 itself, which we, at least the parties that had raised the
16 issues before appreciate very much, Chairperson. So that
17 might, depending on when a response is received, as you
18 know, Chairperson, that litigation should always be the
19 last resort. Should there be no developments then
20 obviously we will take that route, but we wanted to place
21 on record that we will try, insofar as it is within our
22 power, expedite, or, well we'll put the pressure on you,
23 Chairperson, to try and get a response so that we can then
24 go back to clients as to whether they should proceed or
25 wait for the outcome of the approach that we appreciate.

1 The other factor is that the Human Rights
2 Commission - and Ms Le Roux I'm sure will confirm - had in
3 any event sent a letter to the government seeking reasons,
4 which is a precursor to the kind of action that we
5 contemplate, and the deadline for that is today. So that's
6 another, that may well also have a positive outcome or may
7 not, depending on the contents of the reply.

8 The only reason that we are raising this now,
9 Chairperson, really is the quagmire that we explained
10 earlier, in that if it takes too long to respond even to
11 the request of the Commission, then the danger is that we
12 will then be moving at this pace, which our clients find
13 unacceptable, and maybe find out later that the extension
14 is granted when many witnesses would have already been
15 subjected to the current pace that we object to
16 effectively.

17 Specifically now related to my clients, the issue
18 around Mr X is also an important one because Mr X for
19 obvious reasons is a very important witness for the people
20 that we represent. Now should he be called in this hiatus
21 when we don't know whether we are in this fast-pace regime
22 or in a more comfortable regime, then the danger of course
23 is that we might not do justice to his cross-examination
24 and traversing all the issues, and only to find out later
25 that we might have had enough time. I've raised it - we

1 haven't reached any agreement, but I've raised it with some
2 of my colleagues for SAPS and if we reach an out-of-
3 Commission agreement as it were, it might well affect when
4 Mr X gets called in relation to when we contemplate the
5 answer, and whether it's not more prudent to interpose some
6 of the other witnesses whose fast pace might not really be
7 seen to be adversely affecting that client. So that's a
8 matter that specifically affects us, but the rest of what
9 I've said is in line with what the other colleagues, what
10 we have discussed with the other colleagues. Thank you,
11 Chairperson.

12 CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Mr Mpofu, for
13 bringing us up to date and giving us that information.
14 Thank you. Ms Le Roux, are you going to commence the
15 cross-examination?

16 MS LE ROUX: Yes, thank you, and in light
17 of Mr Mpofu's statements I probably should just confirm for
18 the record, today is the deadline that the Human Rights
19 Commission asked the President for reasons with respect to
20 both decisions, his July decision, as well as the deletion
21 of 1.5 which affects phase 2. Like Mr Mpofu we welcome the
22 Commissioner's proactive request to the Presidency. We
23 would hope that the time gets used for at least three
24 important things, to hear from shooters, to have more time
25 with the Lonmin witnesses, and obviously for phase 2 as

1 well.

2 CHAIRPERSON: Yes.

3 MS LE ROUX: We'll keep you updated with
4 respect to any response we receive from the Presidency.

5 CHAIRPERSON: Yes, thank you. Now just
6 for my information, the parties have I understand allocated
7 among themselves the time for cross-examining this witness.
8 Upon you has fallen the chance to cross-examine first.

9 MS LE ROUX: Yes, Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON: How long has been allocated
11 to you?

12 MS LE ROUX: I have two hours.

13 CHAIRPERSON: Two hours, thank you. Mr
14 Wesley will bear that in mind. Alright, you may begin.

15 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MS LE ROUX: Thank
16 you, Chair. Good morning, Captain Kidd. I'm the advocate
17 for the Human Rights Commission in these proceedings and we
18 have a few questions for you this morning. First if I
19 could just pick up some of the points that you made in
20 evidence-in-chief when you were being led by my learned
21 friend Ms Baloyi, just to clarify certain aspects of that
22 evidence that we heard yesterday afternoon and this
23 morning. Firstly you testified this morning that you
24 didn't have the cell phone numbers for the other commanders
25 in order to be able to contact the JOC. Whose numbers did

1 you have in terms of people in the command structure of the
 2 operation on the 16th? Who could you get hold of?
 3 CAPTAIN KIDD: Okay, I had Colonel
 4 Pitsi's number because he was my immediate commander.
 5 MS LE ROUX: And other than Colonel Pitsi
 6 you had no-one else's cell phone number?
 7 CAPTAIN KIDD: I had other TRT members,
 8 but not –
 9 MS LE ROUX: The JOC –
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: No-one in the JOC, no.
 11 MS LE ROUX: And no other commanders?
 12 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, you must realise I
 13 came from Jo'burg. I didn't know any of these people.
 14 They were from, mainly from the North West.
 15 MS LE ROUX: Right, and the other TRT
 16 units that were in your basic line from forward holding
 17 area 2, did you have those unit commanders' cell phone
 18 numbers?
 19 CAPTAIN KIDD: The unit commanders, no.
 20 I had some of the members, like, as I explained I was from
 21 Jo'burg TRT. I came to the Lonmin and the forward holding
 22 area 2 with my 22 members.
 23 MS LE ROUX: Right. Once the group
 24 split, as you described, if we can focus on that moment, I
 25 just want to confirm the sequence, you were walking in your

1 basic line, you then observed the gesture from the officer
 2 in the helicopter and that's when the group started
 3 splitting, correct?
 4 CAPTAIN KIDD: That's correct.
 5 MS LE ROUX: Did you give an instruction
 6 for the group to split?
 7 CAPTAIN KIDD: No.
 8 MS LE ROUX: Did you gesture or direct in
 9 any way that the split needed to happen?
 10 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, at that time, you know
 11 when the strikers were running to the northern side some of
 12 my members were, when they heard the incidents over the
 13 radio they started running wherever, like forward to go and
 14 help. I called them back. I ran to the side, I made sure,
 15 I told the people let's stay in the basic line. I had to
 16 try and find out what we had to do. So everyone was still
 17 fine until the helicopter came and showed them to change
 18 and the instructions by Colonel Vermaak.
 19 MS LE ROUX: And was it of concern to you
 20 that the group was just splitting and you hadn't discussed,
 21 you hadn't had an opportunity to discuss with any of those
 22 other unit commanders or the members what they were going
 23 to do when they moved away from you and you wouldn't be
 24 able to be within earshot?
 25 CAPTAIN KIDD: It wasn't, it was a

1 concern, yes.
 2 MS LE ROUX: Could you do anything in
 3 response?
 4 CAPTAIN KIDD: No, I couldn't because at
 5 that time as we were approaching, that's when the shots
 6 were fired and I just told the people that were around me
 7 just to take cover.
 8 MS LE ROUX: So you at no point had an
 9 opportunity or took the opportunity to discuss with anybody
 10 or give any orders as to how you would move forward even
 11 though you were now going to do it in two distinct groups?
 12 CAPTAIN KIDD: No –
 13 MS LE ROUX: Or at least three distinct
 14 groups, as I understand –
 15 CAPTAIN KIDD: Ja, it was mainly three.
 16 I didn't have any time just to call people and to discuss
 17 the things. As I said, there were shots coming from the
 18 koppie.

 24 at all other than this note in your diary and the page of
 25 notes that you are unable to locate today, did you make any

1 Marikana.
 2 CHAIRPERSON: No, with due respect, I'm
 3 not interested in his view. I don't want to be unkind to
 4 him but we've had opinions of other people but he wasn't
 5 involved in it, he just heard noises on the radio. The
 6 fact that he could hear on the radio what was happening may
 7 in itself be significant in relation to other people who
 8 could hear the radio but that's a different matter, but I
 9 don't – I'm not prepared to allow a question based on his
 10 views on what went wrong at scene 1 but I will allow you to
 11 ask him what went wrong at scene 2 –
 12 MS LE ROUX: The question wasn't relating
 13 to scene 1. I asked him about his view, what went wrong at
 14 Marikana -
 15 CHAIRPERSON: Well, that includes scene
 16 1.
 17 MS LE ROUX: - on the 16th.
 18 CHAIRPERSON: That includes scene 1.
 19 MS LE ROUX: It includes scene 1 but it's
 20 not limited to scene 1.
 21 CHAIRPERSON: Well, insofar as it relates
 22 to scene 1, I disallow the question but I'll allow it in
 23 respect of scene 2.
 24 MS LE ROUX: Captain Kidd, in your view
 25 what went wrong?

 2 charged at the police.
 3 MS LE ROUX: Do you think anything went
